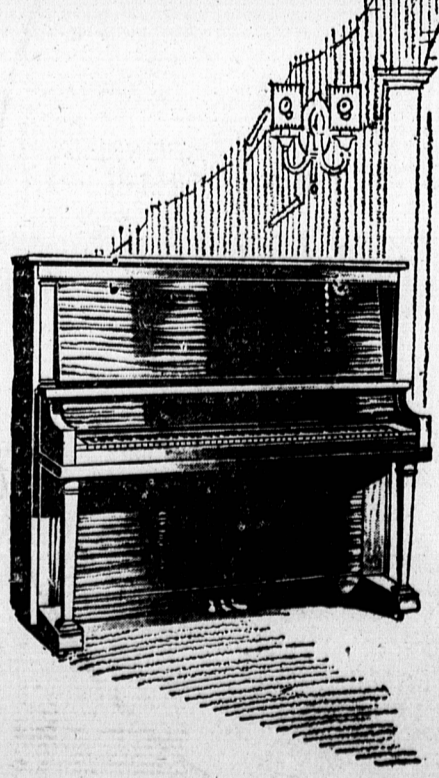

—PAID HIGH TRIBUTE.—At the evening service at St. Mary's Church, Summerside, on Sunday, Ven. Archdeacon White, in an eloquent and beautiful sermon spoke in the highest terms of the work of Most Rev. Clarendon L. Worrell, Archbishop of the diocese of Nova Scotia, since his appointment to the episcopate as Bishop of the diocese twenty-five years ago, the anniversary of which was on Friday last, St. Luke's Day. Ven. Archdeacon White gave an interesting account of the Archbishop's activities in the diocese, pointing out the fact that during his term of office there has been much unrest and world conflict, but in spite of this the Church has flourished under his leadership and guidance. He also made especial mention of the work of His Grace in connection with the building of All Saints Cathedral in Halifax, N. S.

—DUNBLANE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.—The regular monthly meeting of Dunblane Women's Institute was held on the evening of Friday, October 11th, at the home of Mrs. D. A. McPherson. Eight members responded to roll call and there were also twelve visitors present. The time was spent chiefly in a discussion of plans for a concert which it is proposed to hold at some future date. Mrs. D. A. McPherson was appointed to select a play and have the books on hand for next monthly meeting. This will be held at the home of Mrs. Percy McPherson on Friday, November 9th. —PROHIBITION CASES.—Magistrate George S. Tweedy held prohibition court at the Court House in Summerside at one thirty p. m. on Saturday. Unusual interest was manifested in the proceedings, owing to the large number of cases to be tried and there was a large attendance of the public besides quite an array of Counsel. In some of the

cases the evidence was quite lengthy and the proceedings occupied the attention of His Honor the entire afternoon. An added interest was lent to the proceedings on account of several of the cases against local parties being brought on evidence supplied by Mr. M. L. Frank MacKinnon, the new and energetic prohibition prosecutor. The first case taken was an excise case in which a Summerside man was convicted of an infraction of the Customs Act on information laid by preventive officer Platts and fined \$100 and costs. For the illegal consumption of liquor, a Summerside party was fined \$25 or twenty days in jail. A second \$15 or twenty days; a third \$20 or twenty five days; a fourth \$10 or twenty days; a fifth \$15 or fifteen days and a sixth \$25 or twenty days. Also for the illegal consumption of liquor, a man from Clermont was convicted and fined \$30 or thirty days. Cases against two parties from Lot 15, one for having liquor unlawfully in his possession and the other selling liquor, were dismissed. A case against a Summerside man charged with selling liquor was also dismissed. A party belonging to the eastern section of the province, who had been found with liquor in his possession whilst visiting Summerside, did not appear to answer the charge and was fined \$400 and costs. Two cases for the illegal consumption of liquor, one against a Summerside man and the other belonging to Kensington, were adjourned until Saturday next for further evidence. Chief Inspector Hayward
