Great Convention

Colonel Dawson, secured the nomination by 43 votes against Mr. Louis Howatt's 30. Mr. Howatt was nominated by Col. Uric Dawson and seconded by Harry Webster. There were two candidates for assemblyman, Mr. Heath Strong, K. C. Summerside, and Mr. Norman Lowther, of Charlottetown. After the nomination Mr. Lowther withdrew and Mr. Strong was elected by acclamation. Mr. T. B. Gillisple, moved the nomination for Mr. Lowther and Mr. Russell Clark for Mr. Strong. Mr. Strong's election was a hearty and unanimous one. A motion was passed at this meeting moved by Col. Dawson and seconded by Leonard Schurman to hold the Conservative conventions in the future at Central Bedque community hall.

CANDIDATES SPEAK Strong in thanking the delegates for his nomination and the hearty support they had given him said that he hoped to redeem the district for the Conservative party. He urged strong co-operation and organization which is the keynote of success in any campaign. He hoped to be able to carry on and work for the District as his grandfather, Hon. W. S. Strong, had done before him when he represented this District from 1862 to 1870 in the legislative council. His grandfather was a resident of Bedque and his integrity and zeal for his party is well remembered by some of the older residents. If elected, Mr. Strong hoped to carry on those high traditions and look after the interests of the people of the Fourth District in the legislative assembly.

Mr. Hugh Morrison expressed his deep appreciation to the delegates for his nomination and said that it would give him great pleasure to work in conjunction with their leader, Hon. J. D. Stewart, who was one of the most worthy men Prince Edward Island had ever had as a leader. He recognized that they would have a hard fight but with such an able colleague as Mr. Heath Strong he was very optimistic as to the result. He had known Mr. Strong for many years and knew him to be one of the most untiring workers for his party. As a resident of Kensington for over thirty years, Mr. Morrison said that he felt confident that he had the hearty support of the district and that he would do his best to retain the confidence that had been placed in him.

OTHER SPEAKERS Mr. J. F. Arnett spoke on behalf of both candidates. In the nomination of Mr. Strong the district will have one of the most outstanding men in Prince County represent the Conservative party. The district is behind both candidates and a better team could not have been chosen for the work ahead of them. With the possibility of men being let out of jail on the new Ticket of Leave there would no doubt be considerable opposition.

Hon. J. D. Stewart, Provincial Conservative leader, offered his congratulations to the successful candidates and expressed his pleasure in seeing such a large and enthusiastic gathering especially at this season of the year. In speaking of the proceedings of the Legislature just closed Mr. Stewart said that the session was characterized by the efforts of the Government to reinstate themselves in the eyes of the people. The Ticket of Leave must appear to the people as peculiar legislation coming from a government which promised to make the Prohibition law "more workable." The Liberal government had solemnly guaranteed to enforce the act. They have made a miserable failure of it. Statute labor was another vote catcher, also the Old Age Pension "census." The enormous amount that the present government had gone behind in the finances of the country was commented upon by Mr. Stewart, also the manner in which the Public Accounts had been presented.

In speaking of the coming election and the prohibition issue Mr. Stewart said that his party would not attempt to put anything over the people as far as the temperance question was concerned. He believed in responsible government and it was for the people to decide the temperance question. He congratulated the convention on having chosen men worthy of being their representatives in the Legislature and endorsed all that the previous speaker had said in regard to the integ-

Annual Meeting Provincial Rifle Association

A largely attended meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association was held in the Board of Trade Rooms last evening. The report of the Chairman of Council and the financial report were read and adopted. The latter showed a balance of \$44.60 on hand. The reports of the committees in charge of the Inter-maritime team and the Ottawa team were also read and adopted. A committee consisting of Lt.-Col. H. M. Davison, Lt. Col. C. Leigh, Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Lt. Col. F. I. Andrew, Major W. J. McDonald and Mr. G. M. Moore were appointed to make arrangements in connection with the practises and selection of the Inter-maritime team. Considerable correspondence was read regarding the altering of the rules in connection with the Inter-Maritime Match. It was decided to leave this in the hands of the incoming council. It was moved that a vote of thanks be tendered Ex-Governor F. R. Hertz for his annual donation while in office of \$100 a year towards the Lt. Governor's Match. A vote of thanks was also moved to be tendered to the donors of all prizes and all others who assisted the Association. Colonel Davison announced that a valuable cup had been given to the Association by Miss Amy Palmer. This cup had been won by the late Major F. P. D. Mr. G. M. Moore. A meeting of the Council was held immediately after the close of the Annual Meeting and Lt. Colonel D. A. MacKinnon was elected Chairman, Lt. Col. C. Leigh, Secretary. It is expected that the range will be open shortly for practise and that the committee having charge of practises for the Inter-maritime team will make arrangements similar to last year, that is to say a number of shoots will be arranged and the highest scorers selected from these shoots to represent Prince Edward Island at Bedford, where the match will be fired this year. It is expected that this year will see a revival of enthusiasm in rifle shooting. The number present at last night's meeting was the largest in several years, and the fact that the indoor rifle shooting was such a success is a good augury for this year's outdoor practise. Following is the report of chairman of Council, Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon. To the President and members of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Rifle Association. Gentlemen:

I have great pleasure in submitting a short report concerning the affairs of the Association for the year 1930. The first event on the program, so to speak, was the Inter-maritime Match between teams of eight men from the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. This was fired at Charlottetown on Thursday, June 12th, and was an interesting contest, particularly between Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. New Brunswick had a remarkable team and when the figures were totalled it was found that they were leading Nova Scotia by thirteen points and Prince Edward Island by eighteen points, having made a rather wonderful aggregate of 770 points, very close to the Inter-maritime record held by Prince Edward Island which is 779 points. That the New Brunswick team was an outstanding one is shown by the fact that of the eighteen men constituting the Bisley team of 1931, four of them fired on the Inter-maritime team for New Brunswick last year. In the evening the teams were entertained at the Drill Hall. The committee having this function in charge had an excellent program and very splendid refreshments, the evening being voted by all present a very happy one. The annual matches were held in July, just shortly before the Dominion election, and this coupled with the fact that having was in full swing accounts for a smaller attendance than usual. However, the shooting was excellent and one of the features was the fact that a great many shoot offs were required to settle ties. The Governor General's Silver Medal was won by Private Roy Coles with Sergt. C. G. McLennan and Sergt. J. B. Poole tying for the bronze medal. In the shoot off Sergt. McLennan won. The D. R. A. Medal was also won by Private Roy Coles with Sergt. J. B. Poole and Sergt. C. G. McLennan again tying for the Bronze Medal. The shoot off was won by Sergt. Poole. Private Roy Coles also won the Davison Challenge Cup, presented by our President Colonel H. M. Davison. The gold medal presented by John J. Louson of Montreal was won by Private Eric Coles. We are grateful to the Columbia Match Company, John J. Louson, Esq., W. C. MacDonald Inc. (British Consols) for their great assistance to us. We were unable to have the services of Captain J. A. Webster as range officer owing to his being absent from the city, but his place was taken by Captain W. H. Worth, who officiated very satisfactorily. The Ottawa team this year consisted of eleven members and as usual they made a very good showing, although we were not fortunate enough to secure a place in the Bisley Team.

RESOLUTIONS The following resolutions were moved by Mr. Thomas Gillespie, seconded by Mr. John Lefurgey and passed unanimously: 1.—That this convention for the fourth district of Prince County desires to place on record their confidence in the Hon. James D. Stewart, as leader of the Conservative party in Prince Edward Island. We wish also to express our appreciation of the very able manner in which he and the other members of the Opposition exposed the incompetence, insincerity and wanton extravagance of the Lea Government during the recent session of the Provincial Legislature. We strongly commend our leader for the careful and constructive criticism by him and his followers during the recent session of many measures presented to the House by the Government. We wish also to place ourselves on record in condemnation of the present Liberal administration for their incompetence and extravagance and violation of their election promises especially in regard to the enforcement of the Prohibition Act."
