Queen Square took a one-game lead in defense of the MacMillan Football trophy by defeating the West Kent rugby squad at the C. A. A. grounds yesterday afternoon 6-3 in the renewal of classic interscholastic series. The series is the best two out of three games. It was the first loss suffered by the West Kenters this season they having previously won two games from Summerside Academy.

Both teams gave a great exhibition of football and kept the large crowd of enthusiastic fans on edge throughout the game. Play for the most part moved up and down the field in see-saw fashion as first one and then the other of the two evenly matched teams would apply the pressure. The boys showed the seniors something in ball-following and deadly tackling. Some good relief booting featured the tilt. The three tries went unconverted.

The first try came about five minutes from the opening whistle when in a neatly executed four man passing play Queen Square backfield ran the ball from their own territory to cross the West Kent line. Laurier MacKinnon was on the end of the play gathering in a pass from MacGuigan. Queen Square made the count read 6-0 shortly after the opening of the second half when they dribbled the ball to the West Kent line. A false tackle by an over-anxious Blue and Yellow clad player resulted in award of a try to F. Gallant, fast following forward of the Purple and white jerseyed team. "Babs" Fitzgerald, diminutive picking quarter, accounted for West Kent's lone tally when he carried the ball over following a five yard scam on the Q. S. S. line midway through the half.

Les Patrick Rebuilds Old Hockey Club

NEW YORK, Nov. 2—March of time has finally caught up with New York Rangers and Lester "the Fox" Patrick, coach of the blue-shirted National Hockey League squad. The "old men of Manhattan" who left New York last spring as the first Ranger team to fail to make the playoffs in the club's 10-year history won't be back to open the new season this week.

Some of the old "originals" will be on hand but in the main Patrick must depend on the youngsters who were promoted from the Philadelphia farm team last season and other minor league material.

Patrick's First Test
The job of blending the veterans and kids provides the first real test of Patrick as a team-builder. Patrick has been called upon to make only one or two replacements a season since he took charge. But all that is changed.

With the brothers Cook parted, Bun being sold to Boston and Bill acting as coach and utility player Patrick has selected the Colville brothers, Mac and Neil, and Alex Shlitsky as replacements. The kids possess a championship complex, having been in turn on the western Canadian junior champions, titlists of the Eastern United States Amateur League and on the championship Philadelphia club of the Canadian-American League.

New Defencemen
Patrick has elevated Joe Cooper and Babe Pratt to defensive posts. The pair starred with Philadelphia and were given tryouts with the Rangers last season. Cooper, a hard body-checker, will work alongside Ott Heller, who has starred with the team several years. Pratt will have Art Coulter, one of the hardest checkers in the league, alongside him.

Rangers' number one line will be made up of Boucher at centre, flanked by Lynn Patrick and Cecil Dillon, while the third line consists of Murray, "Iron-man" Murdoch as pivot, and the veteran Butch Keeling and young Phil Watson on the wings.

Davie Kerr has had two seasons of big league warfare in the Ranger nets and Patrick is not worrying about that post.

Another of the originals who has been pushed aside by Father Time is Ching Johnson, the smiling defenceman, who will be assistant coach and spare rear-guard.

The average age of the "young men of Manhattan" is 25.4 years, and while the team appears fairly well balanced it has a glaring weakness that may spell disaster—the team lacks a top-notch natural left-hander.

Hockey Prexy In Conference

NEW YORK, Nov. 2—(CP)—President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League was in conference here today with a number of League governors, it was learned, but could not be reached for comment as to what developments, if any, had taken place in regard to the New York Americans franchise.

The hotel where President Calder stayed stated tonight he had checked out late in the afternoon. It could not be learned who else attended the conference.

The American situation showed no outward signs of being cleared up following the League's action recently in declaring William Dwyer had forfeited his franchise for failing to meet obligations to the League.

N.H.L. Teams Prepare For Opening Thursday

"Kid" Lulu Scores K. O. Over Ledden

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 2—(CP)—"Kid" Lulu of Timmins, Ont., now fighting out of Moncton, N. B., won a technical knockout over Al Ledden of Saint John tonight as Ledden failed to come out for the eighth round of a scheduled 10-round go, headlining a boxing card here.

Ledden replaced Johnny Lifford, who has been suffering an injured hand and a cut over the eye. At the last minute Ledden offered to substitute and although he put up a game battle he was not in condition to last the limit.

Apart from the third round when the Saint John scrapper landed wicked rights to Lulu's head and face and the second and fifth which were even, Lulu was ahead all the way.

In the six-round semi-final "Bull" Tellino, formerly of Timmins, Ont., and now of Saint John was overmatched with "Kid" Hart of Moncton in a featherweight battle. Hart was named winner after the youthful Tellino out-pointed him in the sixth round.

Hart, the more rugged and seven pounds heavier, forced the fighting but Tellino's dancing about the ring made him miss many vicious swings. Hart's wicked right hand smash to the solar plexus in the fourth slowed "Bull" up for the fifth but in the sixth he mixed freely.

Springfield Downs Reds

OTTAWA, Nov. 2—(CP)—In a wide open game, Springfield Indians of the International-American Hockey League tonight defeated Providence Reds of the same league, 7-4 in an exhibition game for their fourth straight pre-season win.

Paced by Ted Saunders and Alex Smith with two goals apiece and backed by Benny Grant's superb goal tending, the Indians took a lead of one goal in the first period, added three in the second and completed their scoring with three more markers in the final stanza.

Boston Bruins Eke Out 3-2 Win Over Maroons To Take Lead In Series

HALIFAX, Nov. 2—(CP)—Boston Bruins ousted Montreal Maroons to a 3-2 victory here tonight in the fifth game of the team's Maritime training tour and took a one-game lead in the series.

Bruins led all the way, outscoring their red-sweatered rivals 2-1 in the second period and adding another in the third that Maroons matched near the end of the game.

Leroy Goldworthy, Charlie Sands and Cooney Welland tallied the Boston counters while Jimmy Ward and Earl Robinson marked up the Montreal goals. Both teams played well after a slow first period but the Bruins held an edge all the way with a passing attack that was disconcerting to the Maroons.

Tempers flared for a time in the final session when Ray Gettiffe, a Boston rookie, and Dave Trotter tangled. The latter was sent to the cooler for jamming Gettiffe to the boards and later Joe Jerwa and Stew Evans exchanged blows but neither were banished.

All four penalties came in this period. Maroons surged in at the opening of the third but a sustained attack failed to net them a goal. Seven minutes after the bell, Welland broke away and shot from the Maroon blue line after faking a pass. The puck was deflected off Beveridge's skate into the net.

Maroons were unable to get another tally until near the end when Robinson shot through a maze of players from right wing. Portland was off Bruin's defence at the time for tripping Ward.

The first period was slow and uneventful. Except at odd moments play failed to show much brilliance. The Bruins were more effective than the Montreal team throughout but the playing of Bill Beveridge in the Maroons nets kept them scoreless.

Red Beattie of the Bruins did not appear on the ice. He received a minor injury in Saturday's game.
