LONG THAW MELTS DEEP SNOW IN THE COUNTRY DISTRICTS

FREDERICTON, Nov. 20.—The central portion of New Brunswick after being plunged into winter in the first week of November with snow almost three feet deep in more remote sections, and fifteen inches deep here, has in two days been given ordinary autumn conditions. A thaw which set in Friday with fog has wasted almost all snow. The river, which was thought to be closed last week is open except for floating ice and a little hanging on the shores. New Brunswick Potatoes for U. S.

New Brunswick is supplying Maine's famous potato belt with seed potatoes. The Aroostook growers' efforts to obtain disease-free stock.

The Port Fairfield Review announces the arrival of two cars of Green Mountain potatoes imported by George Findlen, of Port Fairfield one car being placed at Stevensville and the other at Grove, two centres in the potato belt.

These potatoes, according to the Review, were secured through the Aroostook Farm Bureau, and put up by G. C. Cunningham, the government plant pathologist for New Brunswick. The prevailing east winds under which they are grown on the north shore of New Brunswick are declared to make potatoes grown there particularly free from disease.

Maine potato dealers believe that, despite the Forney tariff, there will later on develop an active demand for New Brunswick potatoes for the general market in the United States as well as for seed potatoes.

Late reports received from the United States official sources show that although this year's potato crop is 35,000,000 bushels short of the average for five years and last year's crop was 45,000,000 bushels over the five-year average, over 24,000 more carloads of potatoes had been moved this year up until October 28 than were moved all last year.

This year up to October 28, 119,153 carloads have been shipped from Aroostook county, and for the same period last year 94,992 carloads.

This indicates a scarcity of potatoes in the United States, the dealers believe, and consequently an increase in price; but the dealers say that while flour, sugar and other necessities remain down the public will not be inclined to buy high priced potatoes.

It is understood that the Premier will see Premier Craig early in the week and ask him if Ulster cannot negotiate a more reasonable formula than the one adopted, declining to enter an all-Ireland Parliament under any circumstances.
