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LOST DIAMONDS AT SWELL BALL

LONDON, July 27.—Mrs. Marshall Roberts has lost a diamond and pearl collar necklace under circumstances which are causing considerable gossip in London society. The matter has been reported to the police, who issued a description of the article under the caption, "Lost or Stolen."

"I went to the ball, at which there were considerably over 1,000 guests, wearing my collar necklace and other jewels. On entering I took the collar necklace off, and doubling it, wore it on my wrist until supper was announced. At the supper table, where there were ten guests, I again took it off, and, as far as I can recollect, put it on my plate."

"After supper I went toward the vestibule engaged in conversation. Arriving morning to the police, who returned at once to look for it. I could not find it. I made inquiries, but no one had seen it. Carpets were examined, the entrance hall inspected and enquiries made—everything done on the spot that could be done, but without result. I therefore reported the matter to the police, who circulated descriptions and warned the English and Continental pawnbrokers."

"Perhaps the intrinsic value of the collar necklace is \$1,500. Had I lost it in the street I should not have cared. I certainly care more for feelings of others in this matter than my own loss."

The ball at which Mrs. Marshall Roberts's collar necklace was lost was that given by the Duchess of Wellington at Apsley House, and described in last week's papers.
