IN MEMORIAM
MR. JAMES GREENAN
The subject of this obituary notice was born in Ireland in the year 1837 and came to this Province with his parents in 1839 and they first located at East Royalty but subsequently took a homestead at Newton Lot 26 where he continuously resided until his death which took place on May 1st inst. Mr. Greenan may well be classed as one of the early pioneers in this locality who helped to remove the forest "primeval" from the land and turn it into fertile fields for the production of abundant farm crops.

He was an ideal neighbor and citizen during his long life always honest, upright, truthful and charitable towards all those who differed with him in their opinions and best of all he was a true and devoted member of the Catholic Church through whose sacraments at the hands of his devoted pastor Rev. M. J. Smith he made a good and sincere preparation for his eternal reward.

He was a man of strong physique robust and always healthy until two weeks before the end peacefully came.

He was twice married, his first wife predeceased him about 35 years ago and their family living are Francis J., adjoining the homestead; Mary Ellen at home, Mrs. Martin, Fall River; Mrs. Benson, Fall River.

His second wife still survives and along with the above named family have to mourn the loss of a good kind husband and indulgent father in his home at all times.

The funeral procession on Sunday afternoon May 22d to St. Malachis Church, Kinross was the largest seen in this parish for many years there being over one hundred carriages.


Rev. W. E. Monaghan of Seven Mile Bay very acceptably conducted the funeral services at the church and grave.

POWERFUL MYSTERY MOVIE MAKES HIT

ROVERS TAKE OPENING GAME FROM ANCHORS, SCORE 10-5

Lieut.-Gov. Hartz and His Worship Mayor McKenna Officiate on Opening of League-Vets Band Play Lively Airs—About 800 Spectators Witnessed the Fixture—Good Ball For an Opener

Upwards of 800 enthusiastic ball fans witnessed the opening of 1925 organized baseball at the Victoria Park diamond last evening. The Rovers showing classier ball in the pinches, supplemented with timely hitting with men on bases took the end of a 10 to 5 count. Umpire Jack McAleer called the game in the fifth on account of darkness.

It was a great inauguration—with the Veterans Band playing lively airs, His Honor the Lieut. Governor with a beautiful windup tossed the first ball over the plate to His Worship the Mayor, who took the slant like a "regular" backstop. Much cheering greeted the official opening.

The score although somewhat lopsided does not indicate the brand of ball handed out, and for an opening tilt, the performance was good.

Ellsworth the Rover hurler last evening proved himself a moundsman that will bear watching in the League this summer; he has a nice and accurate delivery and his coolness in holding his position is praiseworthy.

The Anchors used three "slant" pitches. McAleer started an inning on a double steal. McDonald's slab bit was relieved by Houston in the fourth, Houston in turn being relieved by Francis in the fifth.

McFarlane started off well on the rubber, but sloppy fielding on long hits slowed him up and he was pulled. Had McFarlane received the support necessary the Rovers' annexation of last night's fixture would have been more difficult.

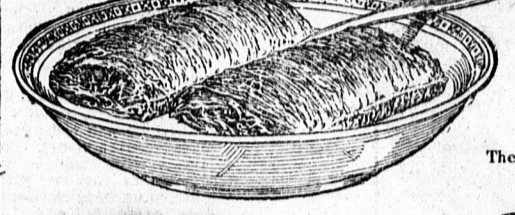
3rd Inning

Western shipping points. For the most part extras and firsts are shipped in export cases and seconds in used cases. The movement into storage continues freely.
