No Province of the Dominion of Canada, or of the Empire, excels Prince Edward Island in its loyal devotion to our Gracious Sovereign, or in its unwavering attachment to that form of government which has been maintained in the United Kingdom and throughout the northern half of this continent from its earliest settlement until the present time.

We sincerely regret that your present visit must necessarily be of such limited duration, but we cherish the hope that it may be of so much interest and satisfaction to yourself and the members of your family, that we may again enjoy the honour and pleasure of welcoming you to this Province in the not distant future.

Princess Edward Island, 29th July, 1912. H. R. H. the Governor General replied as follows: Mr. Mathieson and Gentlemen, I beg that you will accept for the Government and people of Prince Edward Island my heartfelt thanks for your most loyal address of welcome.

It was a source of the deepest satisfaction to me to be called on by my brother, the late King, to serve the Empire in this new sphere, and since my arrival in Canada in October last my pleasure at being designated as His Majesty's representative in this Dominion had steadily increased.

Your address shows me that the same sentiments reign in Prince Edward Island as in the other provinces, and with these sentiments as the basis of national character nothing can prevent Canada from occupying the prominent position in the world which it is her undoubted destiny to fill.

Then the members of the Government and a number of prominent citizens were presented before the party drove to the Marine Wharf and boarded the Earl Grey.

If the city was pleasing by day it was entrancing by night. Decorations were dimmed by darkness but the illuminations which took the place of bunting, flags and trimmings produced a delightful effect.

At this dinner there were present Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Princess Patricia, Col. Lowther, Capt. Bulkeley, Capt. Buller and Miss Adam. Besides His Honor Governor Rogers and Mrs. Rogers there were Premier and Mrs. Mathieson, Chief Justice Sullivan, and Miss Sullivan, U. S. Consul and Mrs. Frost, Mayor and Mrs. Lyons, Senator Yeo, Col. and Mrs. Peake and Capt. Palmer.

Speaking to the Governor His Royal Highness expressed keen pleasure on his visit to this province and to Charlottetown.

At the Experimental Farm His Royal Highness planted a tree in front of Prof. Clark's dwelling. The Duke took an active interest in the farm and discussed farm work in a practical way frequently offering judicious suggestions.

At the pavilion at Victoria Park on Monday afternoon a beautiful banquet was presented to Her Royal Highness the Duchess by Avilash Mathieson, the little daughter of Premier and Mrs. Mathieson.

Besides the prominent citizens and provincialists the following were presented: South African veterans Dr. H. D. Johnson, Major Weeks, Lt. W. C. Cook, Police Officer J. S. Walker, H. H. Brown, John Proud, Duncan Kennedy, Charles Hines, Harry Hyde, Lorne Pigott, Police Officer Kiggins.

An interesting feature of the proceedings was the presentation by His Royal Highness of the long service medal to Harry Henderson of York, who has been section foreman of the Prince Edward Island Railway for thirty-five years.
