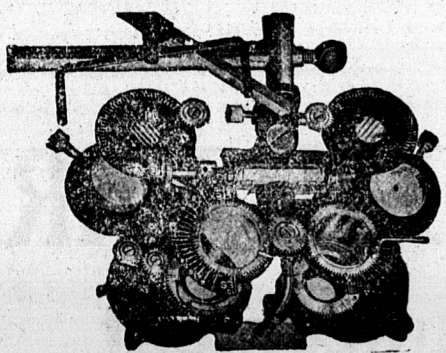

ISLAND FISHERMAN IN PICTOU.—The Pictou Advocate says: A neighbor of ours down the Beaches Road is Capt. Lynch, who occupies the old Judge Fogo place. Capt. Lynch is a Prince Edward Islander who had a lobster packing business on the north shore of the Island for a number of years and who decided to try Pictou as the location for a fishing business in winter he went after smelts and last fall tried for the small herring which are usually so plentiful off our shores and in the harbour but last season were not to be had. This Spring he had a herring trap in operation but the herring were late in striking in here and the lobster factories were supplied from the Magdalenes before the bait struck here. The codfishing was also a failure this year in these waters. Capt. Lynch will give the herring a trial again this Fall, but is coming to the belief that Pictou is not the best fishing place in the world unless it would be for trawlers which could cruise all along the coast. Trawlers require considerable capital but should prove a fine investment, as they are making big money elsewhere.

SOLDIERS AND SAILORS VOTES.—Soldiers who have been on active service overseas and also men who have been employed in the Naval Patrol Service beyond the Canadian Territorial Waters are entitled to vote for a Councillor as well as for an Assemblyman in the Electoral District where they reside on the day of the Election; provided that such persons at the time of enlistment were or now are permanent residents of this province. Soldiers and sailors who have enlisted but have not left the shores of Canada and who otherwise qualified as above have a vote for an Assemblyman only.

SECOND QUEENS.—Probably no candidate in the province has won such golden opinions for himself as Mr. Chester McLure one of the Conservative candidates for second Queens. His manly, honest, straightforward presentation of his case, in contrast with the abusive, whining, railing of his opponents has brought to his side as many opponents of the government. The people have learned that misrepresentation of facts is poor policy to run a government by and they have discovered at the meetings held throughout the province that this is the sum total of opposition policy. The Second District of Queens, which has been in opposition, is going to be represented in the coming legislature, on the government benches by Messrs McLure and Jenkins.

ISLANDER DROWNED.—The New Glasgow News reports a drowning accident last Thursday evening at Trenton, when a young man named James Haferty belonging to Conway Station, P. E. I. lost his life. It seems Haferty and two other young men went swimming near the Locks. The river at that point is quite narrow and the channel quite near the shore. The other two men succeeded in crossing the channel and were quite a distance ahead of the deceased. Just as they reached the shore, Haferty who was then in the channel called for help. The two men started out to his rescue, but before they reached him he sank. A grappling party turned out and dragged the river for several hours without avail. However, the body was recovered next morning by Chief of Police Norman McDonald. An inquest was held and a verdict of accidental drowning rendered. The body will be sent to P. E. Island for burial.

A SPLENDID RECORD.—Among the 133 Officers of the C. E. F. who arrived via S. S. Minnehakda in Halifax Saturday 12th was Paymaster Sergeant Charles M. Aubrey" now four years old, and one sired by "Mayor Todd" three years old the dam of these two fine colts is a half sister to "Baby Logan". Also a green pacer by "Commodore" when these horses are trained they will be an addition to the long list of good horses owned in this province. REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION ACT

CHAPTER 5.

An Act to Provide for a Referendum to the Electors of Prince Edward Island, Regarding the Prohibition Act, 1918, and Amendments Thereto.

Assented to May 15th, 1919.

BE IT ENACTED by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island as follows:

1. On a day to be fixed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council in the year 1920, such day not to be later than two weeks before the session of the Provincial Legislature in that year, a vote shall be taken to ascertain the number of voters within the Province who are in favor of or against the Prohibition Act, 1918, and amendments thereto.

2. At such election every person shall be entitled to vote who would be entitled to vote for an Assemblyman, if an election were then being held for an Assemblyman, and such person shall vote at the poll in which he would be so entitled, if an election were then being held for a member of the Legislative Assembly.

3. For the purpose of such referendum the provisions of Sections 27, 28 and 29 of The Election Act, 1913 shall apply to a referendum held under the provisions of this Act.

4. For conducting such referendum the Lieutenant Governor in Council may make such orders, rules and regulations as to him may seem meet and, subject thereto and so far as not inconsistent therewith the provisions of The Election Act, 1913, as regards procedure shall apply to the referendum to be held under this Act. The costs and expenses in connection with the holding of such referendum shall be paid out of the revenues of the Province.

ORDER IN COUNCIL that year, a vote shall be taken to ascertain the number of voters within the province who are in favour of or against the Prohibition Act, 1918, and amendments thereto, which is ordered and directed that the date for holding the said Referendum therein authorized shall be Wednesday, the 21st day of January, 1920, and that the usual notice and proclamation be issued in due time.
