I. O. F. HIGH COURT OFFICERS CHOSEN

L. U. Fowler G. S., Representative to Supreme Court—Charlottetown to be Next Place of Meeting—List of Delegates in Attendance at the Court.

AFTERNOON SESSION (MONDAY).

The report of the committee appointed at last session to consider the matter of having the place of meeting more central recommended that the annual convocations be confined to Charlottetown and Summerside. The report was discussed at length and ordered to be entered on the minutes so that the matter may be considered by the subordinate courts.

The report of the committee on constitution and laws as adopted, provided for a change in the High Court by-laws giving the Executive the latitude of August and September in which to call the annual session.

The committee on the State of the Order reported the order in this province in a satisfactory condition. The report was adopted.

According to the report of the committee on mileage and per diem 41 courts out of 44 were represented.

The report of the committee on new business called for considerable discussion. It dealt with the question of securing a ward in the P. E. Hospital, which matter was deferred for one year when a special committee should bring in a definite offer from the hospital management together with all other information possible. The report also recommended that an organizer be put in this field.

Court adjourned until 9 a. m. yesterday.

Yesterday morning's session of the High Court opened at 9 a. m. The first business was the hearing of the Financial Committee's report. The report recommended a fixed salary for an organizer, but on amendment it was decided to leave the amount to the discretion of the incoming high standing committee in whose hands also was left the matter of remunerating members who secured candidates. The balance of the session was taken up chiefly with questions asked and replied to by Brother Harpur of Toronto.

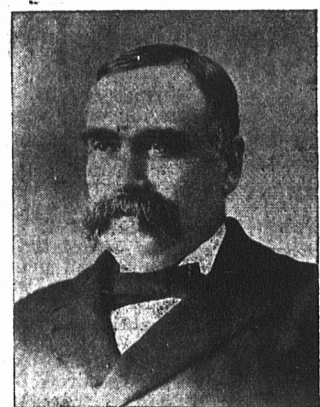

RUSSIANS WHOLLY AT FAULT.

The Naval Court at Shanghai finds the Russians entirely at fault in sinking the British steamer Hipsang on July 18th with loss of life.

There was neither contraband nor Japanese on board.

FULL REPORT CALLED FOR.

Britain has made a request to the officials at Durban for a full report of the circumstances of the examination papers of the steamer Comodien by a Russian auxiliary cruiser off the South African coast.

COLONIAL GOVERNORS NOTIFIED.

The Governors of all British Colonies have been notified to not allow coaling privileges to any belligerent fleet or single ships of either nation.

CHAIN FORT AT PORT ARTHUR, TAKEN.

LONDON, Aug. 23—(Special)—The Evening News hears that the Japanese captured Chain Fort of the Port Arthur defenses on Monday after a tremendous attack.

PRESSING CENTRE AND RIGHT.

Port Arthur reports say the Japanese are hotly pressing the Russian centre along the railway and the Russian right in the vicinity of Golden Hill.

GOT TO STOESSEL'S RESIDENCE.

The Chinese declare that the Japanese have occupied Taiping Tse and penetrated along the railway to General Stoessel's residence on August 21st.

LIAO YANG'S BAIL EXPECTED.

Lloyd's agent at New Chwang reports that Russians are detaining produce from the interior and that Liao Yang is expected to fall shortly.

RUSSIAN WARSHIP SUNK.

The Chinese further report that a Russian warship was hit by a shell recently and sunk in the harbor.

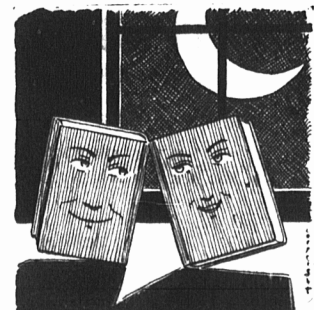
