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SUSSEX CAPTURES N. B. P. E. I. CHAMPIONSHIP BY DEFEATING CRYSTALS LAST NIGHT 3-2

In One of the Hardest and Bitterest Fought Hockey Battles in the Annals of the National Pastime on Prince Edward Island—Sussex Won the Right to Play Off for Maritime Title—Governor Hartz Officiated in the Get-Away—New Brunswickers Will Play the Abegweits Here Tonight.

 SUMMERSIDE, March 3.—About the largest crowd that ever attended a hockey match in Summerside saw the game here tonight, and from start to finish, with two of the fastest teams in the Maritime Provinces battling for supremacy all the time.

There was a special train from Charlottetown with about 250 aboard, and a special from Borden with the regular trains brought great many more. The Western train held until 11 o'clock. His Honor Lieutenant Governor, His Honor R. Hartz, and His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, were seen among the interested spectators at the game.

Although the Sussex team came out on the long end of the score, defeating the Crystals 3 to 2, the Crystals really had the edge on the one at LeClair but he cleared nicely. 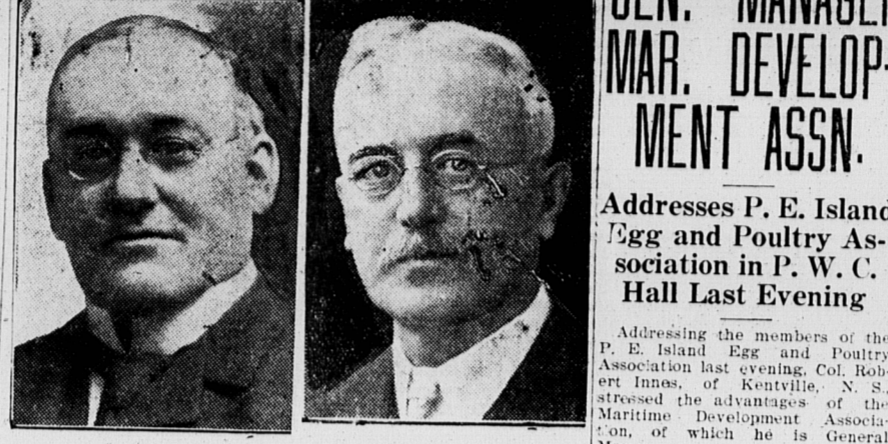

Addresses P. E. Island Egg and Poultry Association in P. W. C. Hall Last Evening

Addressing the members of the P. E. Island Egg and Poultry Association last evening, Col. Robert Innes of Kentville, N. S. stressed the advantages of the Maritime Development Association, of which he is General Manager.

Col. Innes appealed for whole hearted support of the Association as a purely business proposition. The fact that the Maritime Provinces have not made as much progress in the past few decades as might be expected is a matter of common knowledge. We have seen our industrial, commercial and financial institutions swallowed up by larger concerns in Ontario and Quebec. The exodus of our people has been continuous and our market and transportation problems have become more and more acute. It is to the facing of such serious problems as these that the Maritime Development Association is addressing itself. Its organizers have absolute faith in the future of the Maritimes and a firm belief that the only solution of our problems lies in getting together, carefully studying them and then working together unitedly. In other words, the application of the principle of cooperation.

The speaker stressed the need of developing and fostering a stronger MORALE and of substituting optimism for despair. We have been too prone to stand by with our hands in our pockets, leaving it to our Governments to help us out of our difficulties. Governments can do something, but they can do very little without the support and assistance of the people. The fundamental purpose of the Maritime Development Association is to enable individuals and institutions who are working in their own particular spheres to improve conditions, to deal with the general situation as it exists in the Maritime Provinces.

There are a number of contemplated activities, which owing to the lateness of the hour the speaker regretted he could not go more fully into. The Association believes however that one thing should be tackled at a time and the first problem to be met is the problem of markets and transportation. Nothing is suggested in the way of bringing in more settlers at the present time, as it is felt that first of all we must learn to keep our own people at home.

The day of resolutions and delegations as a means of securing our aims, Col. Innes believed, is past. We must deal with our problems as business men deal with theirs—by getting at the facts, and then, armed with the information, presenting the data before the people in whose power it is to act—and seeing that they do act. Along this line, the Association purposes to appoint a Maritime Traffic Expert whose duty it will be to study our transportation problem. This will be a confidently believed that we have in the Maritime Provinces all the essentials for a large and continued industrial development. We have our own coal, iron, timber, water power and the best all round harbors in the world.

The freight rates which manufacturers in Toronto and Montreal have to pay to reach their consuming population should be a basis for the rates which should apply to the Maritime Provinces. Industrial development will bring increased population and this in turn will react upon our market situation.

Perhaps the great industrial development can take place in Prince Edward Island, but it is otherwise in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and this will be of immense benefit to our farmers on the land, as it will bring increased markets closer to our doors.

In conclusion Col. Innes emphasized the importance of whole hearted support of the movement for the greater development of the Maritime Provinces. The effort now being made is to enlist the support of all individuals and institutions to the end. What is wanted is intelligent, aggressive, non-partisan action. When the Association asks the Government of the Railway for something it should be in a position to feel justified in making the request.

The speaker complimented the P. E. I. Egg and Poultry Association upon their encouraging success. "You are doing good work in your particular sphere. There may come a time when you will want the assistance of other organizations in order to overcome some of our problems. Through the medium of the Maritime Development Association that assistance will be available to you and I trust that you will individually and collectively as an Association find your way clear to join us."

ANNUAL MEETING OF P. E. I. EGG AND POULTRY ASSOC.

Held in P. W. College Hall Yesterday—Address and Presentation to Manager Geo. Lightizer at Evening Meeting. Association Had Most Successful Year and Increased Business Nearly 40 Per Cent.

"Farmer's Week" had a very enthusiastic opening yesterday, when in the afternoon and evening, the Prince Edward Island Co-operative Egg and Poultry Association held its eleventh annual meeting with a very large attendance of delegates from the different egg circles.

At the afternoon session, the President, Mr. J. R. Munn of Marshfield, occupied the chair. After the minutes of the last annual meeting had been read by Mr. A. R. Jones, the Assistant Manager, Mr. George Lightizer, Secretary and Manager, read the following report from the Directorate.

THE DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

In reporting on the business of your Association for the past year, the directors have pleasure in stating that it was one of the most successful years on record. Following a year of difficulties and small volume of business, the smallest since the Association started, the volume was increased to over a million dozen eggs or an increase of nearly 40 per cent.

Although expenses were high for the year the average cost per dozen for handling the eggs was reduced, thereby affecting a considerable saving.

The net gain for the year was \$36,233.21 as compared with \$25,853.63 in 1923.

These results were obtained in spite of many difficulties. March receipts of eggs were four times as great as the previous year, and this at a time when American eggs were arriving on the Canadian markets and prices dropping daily. During this time prices dropped 15 cents in one week alone, causing us a loss of from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

Another matter of great difficulty was the shortage of funds. Circles were late in sending in their collateral notes. Eggs were piling up and the market dropping daily, as a result several cars of eggs had to be sold at prices lower than would otherwise have been done.

Six new circles were organized last year, namely, Preetown, Springfield, West, St. Georges, Bloomfield,
