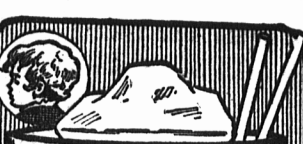

"POSTING THE GLOVE."

Old World Customs of County Fair—Premised Immunity From Arrest.

One of those old-world customs, dating from times immemorial, which are still to be found flourishing in parts of rural England, was observed at Hinton recently, when in quaint phraseology the annual fair was formerly declared open. Attired in a costume somewhat resembling that of the ancient parish beadle, with a three-cornered hat, blue coat and breeches, and red waistcoat, plentifully ornamented with gilt braid, the town crier of the ancient borough took up his stand at mid-day outside the market-house.

As the hour struck, this gorgeously attired official delivered himself of the following announcement: "Oyez! oyez! oyez! The fair's begun. The glove is up. No man can be arrested till the glove is taken down. God save the King." This proclamation, which was made in the presence of the borough officials and members of the council, annually attracts a large crowd of visitors and sightseers, and the words of the crier are chanted in chorus by the multitude. When the Armada was scattered, one of the unfortunate galleons was cast away and sunk in the Tottenmore Bay, Island of Mull. The ship was reputed to hold enormous treasure, and as far back as 1641 the rights of salvage were granted to Archibald Marquis of Argyll. The many attempts since then to discover the millions of money in the remains of the sea have not been successful, but from time to time portions of the ship and of its munitions have been fetched up.

Not long ago a few of these relics were submitted to the inspection and bidding of the curious. These curious spoils of the deep did not, however, fascinate the market. Collectors nowadays draw a sharp line between objects of art and curios, whatever the historical interest of the latter may be. The chief memento was, unquestionably, a bronze breech-loading cannon, 4 1/2 feet long with separate powder chamber. The shot and wad still remain in the gun, and there are traces of powder in the chamber. A nearly-undecipherable date is probably 1563. For this comparatively good price of £55 was paid, and it is understood that the gun will find a home in the museum of the Charter-House School at Godalming.

A piece of the planking of the ship's side, with treenail-holes, made £2, an apothecary's metal mortar £4 10s., and two pairs of antique compasses £4. Six stone cannon balls of 6 1/2 inch diameter brought £7, and two iron balls £1 10s. Grim reminders of the tragedy were several human bones, for which £1 15s. was given. Lastly, a gold double-headed serpent finger-ring realized £6 10s., and 33 large Spanish silver coins, apparently pesos, £25.

Celebrated 100th Birthday.

The hundredth birthday of the Rev. James Way, father of Sir Samuel Way, Chief Justice and Lieut.-Governor of South Australia, has just been celebrated in Adelaide. The aged Methodist minister, says the Melbourne correspondent of a London newspaper, was born in 1804, while the war had broken out afresh between France and England. One of Mr. Way's uncles was killed at Trafalgar, and other relatives served under Nelson at Toulon. As itinerant minister in the early days of South Australia, Mr. Way carried his whole wardrobe and library in a satchel, the library consisting of a pocket book, hymn book and Gurney's "Educational Bible." His first salary was £8 a year, and a small allowance for fire and candles. One of his earliest exploits was a walk from Brighton to Tentenden in order to secure a second-hand copy of Clark's "Commentary."

SIR GEORGE DIBBS.

Picture Career of the Former Premier of the Australian Colony of New South Wales.

Marquis de Fontenay: Sir George Dibbs, former Premier of the Australian colony of New South Wales, had an extraordinary career. He began life as an office boy in a wine merchant's firm in Sydney, after which he took to sea. During the Civil War here, and again during the trouble in South America some years later, he acquired considerable notoriety and wealth as a blockade runner, but after returning to Australia he quickly lost all his money and became a bankrupt. This led him to abandon business for politics. But being blessed with an un governable temper, it was not long before he got into trouble by assaulting a political opponent with such vigor that he had himself landed, being sentenced to twelve months in the penitentiary for the offence.

While in prison he was forced to work in the same way as the other convicts and learned the trade of the penitentiary. In the course of time his forcible methods landed him in the Premiership of New South Wales, and one of his first acts on becoming Prime Minister was to appoint the jailer who had had special charge of him while in prison to the governorship of the penitentiary where he had been incarcerated. On the occasion of his visit to England as Colonial Premier he was invited to Windsor, and not only invited to dinner, but also knighted by Queen Victoria, to whom as a token of respect, he presented a beautifully carved walking stick, which he had carved while doing time in one of Her Majesty's jails in Australia. He was breezy in his conversation, his remarks being rendered refreshing by his lack of education, and I recall a funny incident in this connection, in the course of a political speech which he delivered. He had quoted a Biblical passage in support of his arguments, whereupon one of his political opponents rather maliciously inquired whether the verse was "in the Douay version," that being the name of the English translation of the Bible in use among Roman Catholics.

Sir George haughtily retorted, "The honorable gentleman may go to the library and consult Mr. Dooley if he likes, I have no time to do so." The roar of laughter that ensued disconcerted Sir George and he subsequently had much difficulty to appease the wrath of his Catholic friends and political supporters, who naturally fancied that some slight to their religion was intended by the suggestion that their version of the Bible was the work of "Mr. Dooley."
