Stan Jackson, new Abbie mentor, arrived in the city yesterday.

Jackson joined the Toronto St. Pats in 1921 from the Amherst Ramblers.

Jackson went to Philadelphia in 1928 teaming up two years with the Arrows.

During his playing years Jackson served under such coaches as Art Ross, Frank Nighbor, Goldie Prodgers.

Quizzed last night regarding junior hockey Jackson was strongly in favor of the move.

The new Abbie coach had charge of a junior squad in Port Erie last year.

Canadian Wheat Prices Rise

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2—(C. P.)—Strength in British currencies and substantial purchases of Canadian wheat for shipment overseas lifted grain prices to higher levels on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today.

Sales of Canadian wheat were estimated at 1,500,000 bushels. Reports of frost in the Argentine and curtailed Russian shipments were factors which aided in the upswing.

Prices at the close were close to the high levels reached during the day. Outside markets were firm with Liverpool quoting wheat at 7-8d advance.

Cash wheat and coarse grains participated in the advance and closed at firm levels.

FIRST RACE TO BE HELD SEPTEMBER 15

New York Yacht Club Formally Accepts British Challenge For America's Cup.

(Associated Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 2—The New York Yacht Club formally received the British challenge on behalf of T. O. M. Sopwith for a race for the America's Cup next summer.

The formality of accepting the challenge will be cared for by the committee, headed by Julius S. Morgan, Commodore of the club.

The members of the committee are Morgan, W. A. W. Stewart, E. Townsend Irvin, Cornelius Vanderbilt, George F. Baker, Van S. Merle Smith and G. A. Cormack.

No steps were taken towards naming a defender for the historic trophy and it was indicated little if anything can be done until the details of the series are arranged between the committee named and the Royal Yacht Squadron of England, the challenger.

It is generally expected the 1934 series will be sailed off Newport, where in 1930 Harold S. Vanderbilt's Enterprise tipped the last bid of Sir Thomas Lipton with Shamrock V.

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ROSENBLUM IS FAVORITE OVER WALKER

Light Heavyweight Title at Stake Tonight in 15-round Battle—Small Gate Expected.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 2—Mickey Walker, for 15 years a fighting man, shoots for perhaps his last title tomorrow night in a 15-round light heavyweight championship battle with Maxey Rosenberg in Madison Square Garden.

WILL NOT ATTEMPT TO REGAIN CROWN

Brouillard to Enter Light Heavy Class—Will Take On All-comers.

(Canadian Press) WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 2—Lou Brouillard, short-term French-Canadian holder of the welterweight and middleweight boxing championships, will not attempt to regain the middleweight crown he lost to Vince Dundee Monday night.

Hitler Continues Vigorous Campaign (Associated Press) BERLIN, Nov. 2—Although the issue is hardly in doubt, enthusiastic campaigning continued in full swing tonight throughout Germany in preparation for the Reichstag election and plebiscite on November 12.

Chancellor Hitler, addressing a mass meeting at Essen on disarmament, said the "thief" methods used by others against Germany must cease.

Hitler was preceded by vice-Chancellor Von Papen who appealed especially to the Catholic vote.

Timber Distributors Deny Complaint LONDON, Nov. 2—(C.P. Cable)—Timber Distributors Limited tonight declared statements attributed to Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, that it was at their request the Canadian complaint against British imports of Russian timber had been forwarded to Moscow, were without any foundation.

Loses Fight For Freedom

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 2—Harold C. McDonald's eloquent plea for freedom failed today and the young prisoner sought by police of a half dozen United States cities was found guilty in Supreme Court of forging cheques of the Canadian Department of Pensions.

He had been arrested in Cape Breton while police of Providence, R. I., and other cities below the border were on his trail with warrants charging forgery.

Brought to trial yesterday, the 26-year-old prisoner refused legal counsel, and conducted his own case. Yesterday he cross-examined crown witnesses, and today he questioned four defence witnesses.

The trial ended with McDonald going before the petit jury with a strong appeal for acquittal on the ground of mistaken identity.

Argentine Cattle Men Co-operative BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 2—"Better beef for Britain" might well be the slogan of the group of cattle breeders who have decided to form the first Argentine Meat Export Co-operative in a fight for the dwindling British meat market.

It is the object of this organization to obtain exclusively, the 15 per cent of frozen beef shipments to Great Britain.

Local co-operative stores will also be opened at which prime export beef, which has hitherto been limited, for sale to Great Britain.

SEVERE COMPETITION Severe competition is forecast as Argentina has not only failed to find new markets to replace Great Britain as a purchaser of beef, but her exports to other countries have also fallen, according to the latest official statistics.

These figures show that while beef exports to Great Britain during certain months were 1,833 tons below those for July 1932, total exports showed an even heavier fall of 2,434 tons.

Meanwhile, Great Britain continued to be the only purchaser of chilled meat. Beef exports for the month of July dropped from 32,278 tons in 1932 to 29,844 in 1933, while mutton slumped from 3,692 tons to 2,659 tons in 1933.
