THE S.S. Tiber is expected in port at noon to-day. She will sail as soon as loaded, to Sydney and Halifax.

THE warships Crescent, Ineffable and Proserpine, arrived in port yesterday afternoon at two o'clock. The torpedo destroyer Quail arrived Saturday evening. Vice-Admiral Bedford is on board the flagship Crescent. It is expected that the ships will sail on Tuesday. This morning Lieut. Governor McLintock will make a formal call upon Admiral Bedford.

BIGG'S FROST lobster factory, at Cape Tormentine, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday. When the fire was discovered it had made too much headway to permit the saving of anything. The loss is about \$800. This is a severe loss to these men at this season of the year. The Portland Packing company, who supplied cans, loses about \$100. No insurance on any of the property.—Hx. WHILE the Jacques Cartier was coming to this port on Saturday morning a young man suffering from the effects of liquor jumped overboard. The steamer quickly left him in the rear, and he struck out at a rapid clip, in an opposite direction to swim to a fishing boat not far distant. Several times he dived and it was some time ere the rowers could overtake him. When at last they came up to him he was in an almost exhausted condition, but still fought wildly with his rescuers, who with great difficulty succeeded in dragging him into the boat.

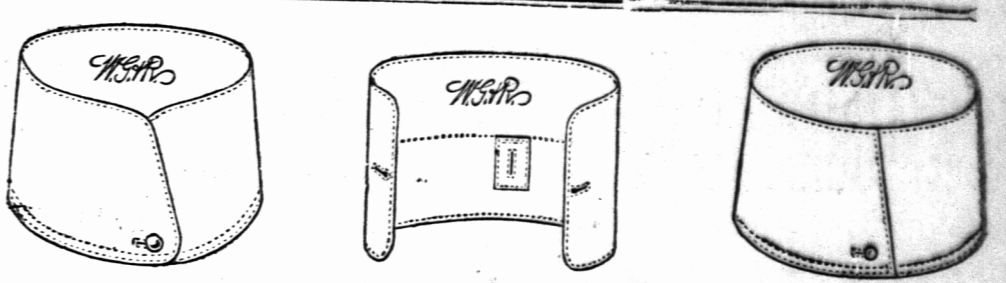

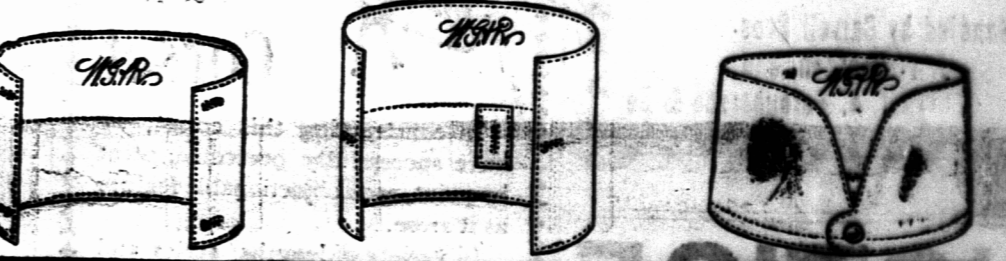
