## ISLANDERS IN CASUALTY LIST

**LAI D TO REST.** The funeral of the late Mr. Chester F. Vanderstine took place yesterday afternoon. Interment was made in the People's Cemetery, Rev. T. W. Murphy conducted the services at St. Paul's Church and at the grave. The members of the I. O. O. F. and Free Masons attended in a body, while many other citizens were present to pay their last tribute. The floral bouquets were very beautiful. The pall bearers were composed of members of the I. O. O. F. and A. F. and A. M.

**LARGE FUNERAL.**—One of the most impressive funerals seen in Charlottetown for some time was that of the late Mr. Ernest J. Toombs on Saturday afternoon. The coffin placed upon a salvage corps wagon, beautifully decorated with wreaths and flowers and appropriately draped, was drawn by the firemen in uniform, deceased being an ex-member of the Fire Department. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Frank Hennessey, Reginald McMillan, Fred Large, Angus McEachern, Wallace Scantlebury and Ernest McTague. Rev. R. G. Fulton and Rev. F. H. Littlejohns conducted the services. Quite a large number of citizens attended the funeral.

**NOTORIOUS "MURDER SHIP" SUNK BY SUBMARINE.**  
Old Herbert Fuller, Renamed Margaret B. Rouss, Torpedoed in Mediterranean.

**NEW YORK.**—The American schooner Margaret B. Rouss, which was famous in the nineties as the "murder ship" in which three persons were murdered in a cruise between Boston and Nova Scotia, was sunk by a submarine April 27 in the Mediterranean. The ship was bound from St. Andrew's Bay, Fla., to Genoa, with a pine lumber, Captain Fred L. Root, said that he and his crew of six were robbed of all money and personal effects by the German submarine commander and set adrift. They were landed on Monte Carlo by a patrol boat.

The murders, which roused the horror of the nation, took place July 14, 1896. While they slept in their cabins, Capt. Root, his wife and Second Mate Banberg were killed with an axe. Thomas Bram, the Negro mate, was accused, and after a long trial in which Lester Monks, the only passenger, a Harvard student who lived in Brookline, was the principal witness, Bram was sentenced to life imprisonment. The trial was held in Boston and Bram was sentenced to the Charles town prison, but was removed to Atlanta, where he was pardoned by former President Taft in 1912. The incidents in the murder furnished the plot for a popular novel of recent years.

Mrs. A. G. Lewis, Cardigan Bridge, has received word that her brother, Pte P. J. McCormack, who enlisted with the 158th Battalion, "Duke of Connaught's Own," in Vancouver, B. C., was wounded in the leg with shrapnel, on May 7th, and admitted to Pavilion Hospital, England. He has been in the trenches since Dec., and was through the battle of Vimy Ridge, where he had the experience of being knocked down many times by shell explosions, without being wounded. Pte. McCormack is the youngest son of the late Mr. John McCormack, who was Customs Officer at Cardigan for many years.

**RICHARD MUTLOW**

There passed away at Millview, P. E. Island, on Sabbath, May 27th, 1917, Richard Mutlow, an aged and respected citizen. Deceased was in his eighty fifth year and for some time had been laid aside from the active duties of life. He leaves one son, Thomas, of Millview, and two daughters, Lucy at home and Mrs. James Llewelling, of Gasperaux, P. E. Island. One sister, Easter, also survives him. Mr. Mutlow was brought to a knowledge of his Saviour in early life under the ministry of the late Rev. Donald McDonald, and was ordained an elder in the Church of Scotland. The funeral took place on Tuesday, 29th. Rev. Ewen McDougall conducted the services. A large number of people followed the remains to Birch Hill cemetery, where interment was made.

Our visitor reports she found him very restless and complaining of queer sensations and aches in his right arm. His wounds are healing. The cause of the feelings he has may be caused by that, I hope to tell you next time that he is easier. Everything that can be done to make him feel better and happier is being done. I will report all news I get.
