RED CROSS WORK.—The Cavendish Red Cross Society has been silently working for the last six months and the following is the statement of the work done—132 pairs of socks for the boys in the trenches, 29 pairs of which were filled with Xmas gifts. Seven night shirts and five pyjama suits for the Hospital. The ladies of the Red Cross Society are deeply grateful to Mrs. Margaret MacNeill who although being blind, has knit thirty three pairs of socks. Mrs. William Graham contributed three pair socks. Mrs. William Moore two pair socks. The Society has adopted two prisoners of war and the receipts for six months were \$98.43. Expenditure \$93.45. Balance on hand \$4.98c.

PIE SOCIAL AND CONCERT.—The Pie Social and Concert of Green Bay School which was planned and carried out under the direction of the teacher Mr. Louis Costello was held in Tyrone Hall on April 21st and in Hampton Hall on May 4th and was a marked success. The pies were very easily auctioned by Mr. Robt. Currie of this District, assisted by Mr. Cammie Costello. A lengthy program of songs, dialogues and recitations and acts made up the entertainment, with excellent musical selections between the acts given by Mr. Pope Costello as violinist and Miss Janie Dunston of the Melville Road who acted as organist. The proceeds of the pie sale are to be used for the School purposes, while half the proceeds of the latter was given in aid of the Red Cross.

SUDDEN DEATH OF YOUNG LADY.—The remains of Miss Mary E. McMasters, who died very suddenly in Fredericton, N. B., of meningitis, arrived in Charlottetown by the express on Tuesday night and was conveyed by the afternoon train yesterday to her former home in Montague, for interment. The Fredericton Gleaner gives the following particulars of the young lady's death:—"Death came with startling suddenness last evening to Miss Mary E. McMasters at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Livingstone, George Street. Miss McMasters returned to the city last week from Boston and intended taking a position in the city today. On Saturday morning she complained of not feeling very well and on Saturday evening was up town with a friend. On returning to the house she complained of her throat and yesterday a physician was summoned and she passed away last evening. The deceased was 22 years of age and is survived by her father, Mr. David McMasters, of Prince Edward Island, who is expected to reach the city this evening."

Returning home he always travelled by rail across Siberia to Vladivostok, then by steamer to Vancouver and home by the C. P. R.

LIST OF DELEGATES COMPLETED.—In addition to the list of delegates mentioned in yesterday morning's Guardian who are to attend the Win-The-War Conference in Montreal next week the following have since consented to go thus completing the number that the Province was asked to send: Dr. Bagnall, Dr. Conroy and Mr. John McKenna.

EASTERN ROUTE.—Passengers from Pictou and other eastern Nova Scotia ports are now availing themselves of the services of the steamer Enterprise which plies three times a week between Pictou and Georgetown, Murray Harbour and Montague. A number of commercial men came across by that route yesterday arriving in Charlottetown by the regular train.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.—Mr. L. E. Prowse has received word from his brother, Major W. B. Prowse relative to the wounding of Gunner Reginald A. Ramsay, of No. 2 Canadian Siege Battery. The Major says Reginald was hit by shell fire on the 21st. A piece of shell struck him on the arm on the fleshy part between the shoulder and elbow, and when he left the dressing station he was waving his hand to the battery, and shouting as happy as a lark. At the time he was hit two other men were killed and five more wounded. Other than the above, the Major states everything is going well with the battery, although severe work is expected when the big spring campaign is on. Another letter to Mr. Prowse from Gunner Ramsay himself is dated, First Eastern General Hospital, Cambridge, England. In the course of it he says: "I am getting along fine; was wounded on the 21st, two of the boys were killed and five wounded. Poor Morpeth Robertson was killed. I was very lucky—one piece of the shell just touching my cheek and the other sinking into my shoulder. I went under X-Ray treatment two days ago, and expect to be operated on at any minute; there is no need to worry, I expect to be out in four weeks at the most. We were in a very hot part of the front, and Fritz was shelling us very hard. I was buried with dirt a short while before, when the Germans put over some big ones, direct hits on a bunch of us. I am very lucky to be here, but then somebody has to be lucky, and I think it is my turn anyway. This is a splendid hospital, and we are treated O. K., etc., etc. The many friends of Gunner Reggie (Buckey) Ramsay will be glad to read of the above, and that he is progressing so favorably."
