ISLAND JERSEYS WIN HONORS—The Jersey cow Standard's Contesse (Imp.) a half sister of Harold Stead's herd sire at Charlottetown, has recently completed the sixth highest record ever made in Canada in the mature 365 day division for B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton, Ontario. This great cow at 6 years of age has produced in 365 days, 13,172 pounds of milk, 933 pounds of fat, with an average test of 7.08 per cent. This is equal to 166 pounds of butter.

BUGLARY—It was discovered Saturday morning that during the night previous burglars had visited the store of Mr. Alton Burke, situated in the east end of the "Market Building and goods to the value of about \$25.00 were taken, principally cigars, cigarettes and tobacco. It is supposed the parties who made this break secreted themselves in the main building when it was locked for the day. Entrance was gained to Mr. Burke's section, which is partitioned off by glass, by carefully removing one of the large sashes, which was placed in a butcher's stall. The canned goods on the counter were neatly piled on the floor. The intruders evidently took it for granted they would not be disturbed, as everything points to the job being conducted methodically. An exit was easily made on the south side of the building.

COUNTY COURT—The March session of the County Court opened at Summerside on Friday last, His Honour, Judge Inman presiding. There were thirty cases on the docket. These included seven garnishee applications. The latter were all disposed of. Following the disposal of these cases, the regular docket was taken up in which there were four non suits. On account of three of the Summerside attorneys being in attendance at the local Legislature, several cases in which they are interested were postponed and set down for a future date, with the consent of Counsel. The following cases were disposed of: Bruce McKay & Co. Ltd. vs. E. T. DesRoches. Judgment for plaintiff, \$81.32. The T. H. Eastbrooks Co. Ltd. vs. Black and Co. Judgment for plaintiff, \$29.38. Charles McNeill vs. James Crossman. Judgment for plaintiff \$28.75. Bradford LeClair vs. Percy McRae, action for wages \$208. Judgment for defendant. Each party to pay their own costs. Court adjourned until March 29th when the case of Bruce and McKay Co. Ltd. vs. Frank Bowness will be heard.

UNUSUAL NUMBER OF SEALS—From reports from Campbellton in the western part of the Island there are thousands of seals on the ice along the shore from Campbellton to Miminigash. This is most unusual. Every year a few seals are seen in this locality but never within the memory of the oldest inhabitant have they coat they join the older seals, who sport on the ice cakes and dive under the water. When they first made their appearance the people been seen in such large quantities. They are of various colours, black, brown, grey and spotted. There are hundreds of young ones, which are white in colour, these remain on top of the ice all the time until they lose their first coat and turn colour. They appear to eat nothing but ice. After they change their chased them and many were captured and killed. Others were kept as pets. But now not much notice is taken of them. Recently four young men nearly lost their lives hunting the seals, but were rescued by Ingham Costan and others, who went out in a dory some seven miles where they were marooned on ice cakes, which had broken away from the main ice. It is reported that inquiries are being made from Newfoundland as to the number of seals in Island waters, which might result in sealing vessels making a trip to the west shore with a view of capturing them for their oil and skins.

DIGGING OYSTER MUD—It is reported that large quantities of oyster mud are being removed from deposits in various parts of Prince County, chiefly from the Bedouque and Malpeque Bay districts. This is the first season for a number of years that any large quantities of this fertilizer had been procured. As oyster shells have a very high percentage of lime, the mud can be used to replace lime as fertilizer. In years past the mud was used on many farms in the province with excellent results, but of late years due to the availability of lime, and of crushed limestone at a comparatively low price it has been little used.

SOCIAL GATHERING—A nicely arranged dinner was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Peters, 17 Upper Prince Street, on Friday evening, March 17th, the guest of honor being Mr. Louis Levesque of Quebec at present attending St. Dunstan's University. The death occurred in North Wiltshire Friday afternoon of Mr. Murdoch McLean, aged 80, one of the outstanding business men of this province, widely known and greatly esteemed.

Mr. McLean started in business 62 years ago, when he opened up a tailor shop and had as his apprentices men who afterwards became successful merchant tailors in this city.

He was the son of Donald McLean and Anne Morrison, both natives of Scotland, who were among the pioneer settlers of this province.

The late Mr. McLean was President of the Prince Edward Island Mutual Fire Insurance Company, and a director of other important companies. He took a deep interest in the welfare of the community, always actively supporting all beneficial measures for the public good. His wife died twenty years ago. There are left to mourn five sons, Gordon and Morrison at home, Sterling in Charlottetown, Dr. Shelton and Dr. Lorne in New York, also two daughters, Miss Bessie at home and Mrs. (Rev.) W. J. MacLeod, of New Glasgow. Two brothers, John, at North Wiltshire, and Archibald, of Los Angeles, and formerly of Charlottetown also survive.

He was in his barn doing up the chores when he was kicked rather viciously by one of his cows, the animal's hoof striking his leg between the knee and the ankle. G. W. WEST EXPERIENCES EARTHQUAKE SHOCK—A friend is in receipt of a letter from Mr. G. W. West, of Innisfail, who was in San Diego at the time of the recent earthquake in Southern California. On the day of the quake about 5.55 p. m. he was sitting in his apartment in San Diego reading, when, without the slightest warning, the standing electric lamp beside his chair fell over on him. He got up quickly but was dizzy and at first his feet and legs appeared to refuse to act. Finally he got outside to find the street filled with people. He then realized that it was an earthquake. Very little damage was done as far south as San Diego, 140 miles south of Long Beach, the centre of the quake. For a time his bank cheque book appeared to function owing to the bank upheaval in the U. S.
