politicians and others. The Bishop of St. Asaph was a very able man who had given the promoters of Disestablishment some hard knocks. The non-conformists brought down Lloyd George to speak at a public meeting held on their behalf, and this is the way he was introduced to the audience by the chairman, a leading deacon of the village: "We have suffered much, of late; the Bishop of St. Asaph has been speaking against us and we all know that he is a great liar; thank God that we have a match for him here tonight in Mr. Lloyd George."

The story of Mr. Lloyd George's rise in his profession in parliament and in the great world of politics and diplomacy, as President of the British Board of Trade, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Minister of Munitions, and finally as Prime Minister of the British Empire, is familiar to every reader of The Guardian. It supplies at once an example, a lesson and an inspiration to every bright boy in Canada. If from his lowly foster-home in the remotest part of Wales, Lloyd George could rise to the highest and greatest positions of influence in the statesmanship and diplomacy of an old and conservative country such as Great Britain, may not the youths of Canada aspire

and win success, however poor and unpropitious the conditions in which they now live.
