Lime Controls Club Root

Club root of cabbage may be controlled by heavy applications of lime on the infected soil. From 10 to 80 bushels of limestone per acre are required to completely destroy the disease. Club root also attacks cauliflower, particularly when grown on soil infected with the club root of cabbage. The lime applied to control the disease is also effective in sweetening the soil, thus resulting in a greater crop increase.
