The tide of opposition to the running of motor cars on the public highways of Prince Edward Island which took shape about two years ago, rapidly gathered head, and culminated in that piece of legislation of 1908, entitled, An Act to Prohibit the Operating of Motor Vehicles on the streets and roads of Prince Edward Island, seems to have reached high water mark. At any rate there is in evidence a disposition on the part of farmers, business and professional men in general to take a rational view of the situation, and discuss the question on its merits. On Monday night, in York Hall, before a large and representative audience the question: Resolved that we petition the Local Legislature to repeal the Motor Vehicle Act of 1908, was discussed. All the stock arguments of the "stand patters" were marshalled with military precision by the opponents of motor cars, the danger, the accidents, the dislocation of trade, the odor of gasoline, the goggles, the of the chauffeur; all these things were put forth before an eager, listening audience. But the resolution was so strongly supported that when the question was put to the meeting after more than two hours arguments it carried the day by an overwhelming majority. The question resolved itself into a discussion as to whether we should move forward, keep up with the times, and make our little Province flourish as the palm-tree; or through narrowness of vision, stay the wheels of progress, offer the incentive, and make ourselves ridiculous in the eyes of more progressive states.—Com.

On Tuesday evening February 23rd, a large and appreciative audience greeted the members of the Altra Dramatic Club on their first appearance of this occasion; and on this occasion a first-class entertainment was amply sustained. A Patriotic Chorus by a number of ladies and gentlemen was well rendered and was a commendable feature of the program. The comic dialogue by Mr. and Miss Kinch was heartily applauded. The step-dancing also by Leo McIntyre and Austin O'Brien and the sword-dance by little Henry McIntyre were repeatedly encored and the evening closed with a sale of Pies and Baskets, from which a large sum was realized. The good order which prevailed throughout, notwithstanding the crowded condition of the building, was a tribute to the character of the audience. Benj. Dunbar presided to the satisfaction of all.

The floral tributes were very beautiful and included a wreath from the Provincial Legislature, a harp from Lieutenant Governor McKinnon, a crescent from Premier Hazard, a star from H. Mrs. Harry Cox, of Morill, has returned from New York, where she had been undergoing medical treatment.

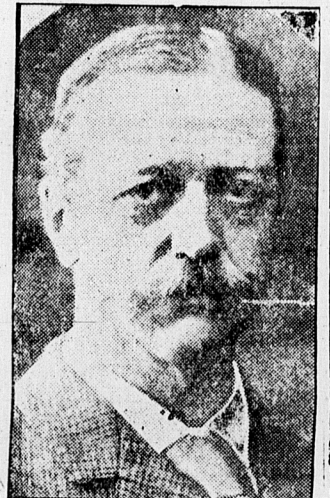

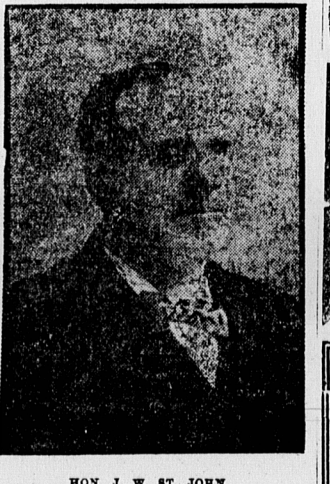
