To Receive Medal By Radio

(Special to the Guardian)

MONTREAL, Feb. 15.—For the first time in the history of the world the official presentation of a medal granted for life saving will be made by radio when next Wednesday night February 17th at 9:30 o'clock Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways speaking from C. N. R. O. Ottawa will present the medal of the Royal Humane Society of Canada to Mrs. P. G. Polyblank, a resident of O'Brien a small community in the hinterlands of Quebec.

In the home of Mrs. Polyblank at O'Brien a receiving set has been installed and she and the principal residents of the community will be gathered there when the presentation is being made. Tests carried out over a period of weeks have proved consistent reception of CNRO at O'Brien. An official of the company will make the trip to O'Brien with the medal and as Sir Henry actually utters the words of presentation the decoration will be handed to Mrs. Polyblank.

The deed for which Mrs. Polyblank has been recognized by the Canadian National Railways and the act for which she is being honored is the saving of the life of a child who had fallen from a motor boat in the centre of Long Lac a large body of water in northern Ontario many miles distant from any large settlement.

Mrs. Polyblank with two children of her own, two women friends one of whom was accompanied by a two year old child was crossing Long Lac in the motor boat Mrs. Polyblank operating the engine. A scream from one of the workmen notified Mrs. Polyblank that the child had fallen overboard. The boat was then almost a mile from shore. Without any hesitation Mrs. Polyblank jumped overboard and went to the rescue of the drowning child. None of the other occupants of the boat, knew how to operate the engine and they were unable to go to the assistance of Mrs. Polyblank. The boat carried on under its own power and finally piled up on the shore. Fortunately it happened that a woodsman was nearby and being attracted by the screams of the women he ran to the rescue and sensing what had occurred, refloated the motor boat and went to the assistance of Mrs. Polyblank. When he reached her she was almost exhausted and undoubtedly she would have been drowned had she not been able in the meantime to divest herself of much of her clinging clothing.

This gallant act would have passed unchronicled except for Frank H. Cooper, K. C., legislative secretary for Northern Ontario Department of Lands and forests who hearing of it brought it to the notice of the Royal Humane Society of Canada. Sir Henry Thornton was keenly interested when informed and agreed to make the presentation and when it was found inconvenient for him to make the trip to O'Brien at this time it was suggested that he make the presentation by radio.

Mrs. Polyblank is a true daughter of the north. She was born and bred in the north country and has lived there all her life. Her father whose surname was Cummings was a factor of the Hudson Bay Company at Point-Bleu in the Lake St. John District of Northern Quebec and he was intimately and affectionately known among the Indians as "The White Partridge". When Mrs. Polyblank performed her gallant action her husband was stationed on the Canadian National Railways near Long Lac. Since then they have been removed to O'Brien Mr. Polyblank having been appointed assistant chief engineer of the Rouyn Mines Railways to Rouyn in the heart of the new mining field in northern Quebec.
