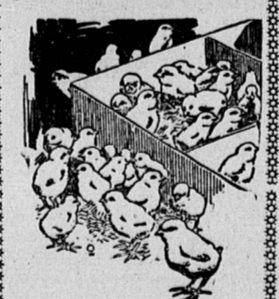

(Continued from page 8) Shrubby Evergreens.

Juniperus—The Junipers, J. communis, the common Juniper, native of Ontario; foliage bluish or greyish green; spreading shrub; useful for planting on light gravelly and shallow soils and on rockwork. J. communis hibernica—The Irish Juniper, of columnar form, six feet; useful for planting in formal gardens, parks and cemeteries as a specimen; not fully hardy north of latitude 45 degrees. J. suecica—The Swedish Juniper; a compact upright form, harder than hibernica; useful for same purposes. J. sabsina—The Savin Juniper; spreading form, useful for planting on banks in large masses. J. foemina—Of prostrate habit, useful for massing. J. sinensis-Pfitzeraena—Deep green, spreading type more generally grown than others; for rock garden and mass planting.

Pinus—P. Mugho, the dwarf Mountain Pine, useful for massing and foundation planting. A slow growing species which does not assume the proportions of a tree. It is very hardy enduring to at least latitude 50 deg. Plant four to five feet apart.

Picea—The Spruces. Dwarf varieties such as maxwelli, gregoriana and nana are adapted for planting on rockwork and massing in restricted areas.

Retinispora—Among the Retinisporas are many beautiful dwarf evergreens. The tall kinds about five feet are R. pisifera and variety aurea; the latter with golden foliage; R. pisifera filifera with threadlike branches; and R. pisifera filifera plumosa, the Plum Cypress. There is also a golden-leaved variety of this. Among the dwarf kinds are R. obtusa and variety gracilis; R. pisifera filifera compacta and R. squarrosa vetchii. The tall ones are adapted for grouping to the rear as in foundation planting and in borders and as specimens. The dwarf kinds are for the front of such po-

sitions. All are equally valued for filling beds as in formal garden schemes. One or two kinds are hardy north to Ottawa, others are adapted only for planting in extreme Southern Ontario and the Pacific Coast.

Taxus—The Yews, nothing more classic in dwarf evergreens. T. brevifolia, a dwarf variety, and T. cuspidata, the Japanese Yew, are the best. The latter is very hardy and may be planted to latitude 48 degrees. Useful for foundation planting and grouping at side of lawn and for beds.

Thuja—Among the varieties of T. occidentalis, the arbor vitae, are a few dwarf ones which are excellent for front positions in foundation planting. Compacta, Ellwangeriana, Globosa and Hoveyi are among the best and are also adapted for the rock garden. The tall Thujas are really small trees, but may be employed for a few years in foundation plantings, being removed when they become too tall. Wareana, Pyramidalis and Vervaeana are good forms. Hardy to latitude 48 deg.

Picea pungens kosteriana glauca is the most beautiful of all the pungens varieties if not the most ornamental of all evergreens of the rigid type. It is known as Koster's blue spruce. This is the one most desired as a specimen on all manner of lawns. Hardy into the prairie provinces.

Pinus—The Pines. P. austriaca, the Austrian pine, a large and handsome tree with dense and deep green foliage. Useful for massing, but especially desirable as a lawn specimen. P. banksiana, the native jack pine, useful for windbreak, as a shelter belt and as a screen. P. cembra, the Swiss stone pine, a lovely tree of compact and shapely growth, makes a very beautiful lawn specimen. P. ponderosa, the bull pine, resembles the Austrian, but is of looser growth. For same uses, P. sylvestris, the Scotch pine, quick growing and splendid for massing in boundary planting, windbreaks, and will withstand city conditions. 9272-5-6-21.

With the exception of F. Cembra, a tree of 20 feet, the pines reach 30 feet or more.

Pseudotsuga—P. Douglasii, the Douglas spruce, a splendid specimen tree. This and a variety glauca with bluish foliage are very graceful and desirable. Thirty to 40 feet.

Thuja—The arbor vitae. T. occidentalis, a native tree of about 30 feet. Useful for massing wherever evergreens are desired. Makes a splendid hedge when clipped. A splendid specimen. Very hardy.

Tsuga—The hemlock spruce. T. canadensis, one of the most graceful native evergreens. A wonderful specimen. Useful for sunny or semi-shady positions.
