SERVICE FOR THE DEAD.—Yesterday the annual service for the dead was held at the Catholic Cemetery. It was largely attended. The League of the Cross Band headed a large parade of the members of that society and the K. of C. from St. Dunstan's Cathedral to the cemetery, where His Lordship Bishop O'Leary officiated, assisted by several of the clergy. The Miserere Mei were sung, and prayers were offered for the repose of the departed members of the congregation. His Lordship delivered a discourse appropriate to the occasion.

SOLDIER RETURNING.—Mr. Geo. Stewart, Prince Street, received a telegram yesterday from his son Sgt. Charles Stewart at Halifax stating that he would arrive home tonight. Sgt. Stewart enlisted in Major Owens's Battery and after two years in the pay office in London, went to France where he took part in all the fighting of the Battle of Vimy. On the signing of the armistice, on the 11th of November, he was again taken to the pay office where he served until demobilization was completed. His many friends will give him a warm welcome on his arrival.

A BAD ACCIDENT.—A horse and cart belonging to Mr. George Tweedy, Mount Edward Road and which was being driven by a boy, came to grief when it struck the rear of a car being run into by an automobile. It is said that the driver of the automobile who had his license revoked some time ago, was intoxicated, and was taking up practically the whole of Tweedy's horse when the accident occurred. The boy who had the loan of Tweedy's horse was returning home and was opposite the Experimental Farm when the automobile crossed into the team, smashing the shafts of the cart, breaking one wheel, cutting the horse in three places and injuring the boy's leg. After striking the team the automobile ran into the adjacent fence on the wrong side of the road, where it stuck for some time. Mr. Tweedy is naturally indignant over the affair, and the indications are that he will not let the matter drop.

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CLEVER PIECE OF WORK.—In the window of the "Two Macs" druggists, Great George Street, is displayed what is without question the most handsome piece of workmanship of the kind yet seen here. It is an electric chandelier made of a 32 pound shell case, one of those "fragment" from France" which have come into such popular use for making various ornaments and useful devices. interchange of allied commemorative war medals. The medal is bronze and will be attached to the ribbon by a ring. The ribbon will be red in the centre with green and violet on each side shaded to form the coloring of two rainbows. The claims of those entitled to wear this medal must be approved by the competent military authorities. The medal will be granted to all officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the British, dominion colonial and Indian forces; members of women's formation, who have been enrolled under a direct contract of service for service with His Majesty's Imperial forces; civil, medical practitioners, nursing sisters, nurses and others employed with military hospitals, who actually served on the establishment of a unit in a theatre of war within the period that operations were carried on in that theatre during the war. Instructions as to the submission of claims and the disposal of the medals have not yet been received.
