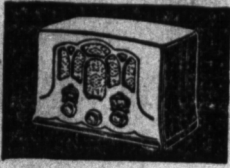

**2 SHOPPING DAYS TO CHRISTMAS**

**BRIEF STOCK FLOWING ON N.Y. EXCHANGE**

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—(A.P.)—Stocks had a brief but rather severe relapse today following reports that the New York stock exchange was enquiring into the recent gyrations of some of the more volatile specialties.

In a fast grueling flurry that lasted about half an hour and put the ticker tape several minutes behind, losses of \$3 to \$10 a share were suffered by a number of issues. Extreme declines were pared before the close, however, and most of the leaders were only a few cents to around \$1 a share.

The storm broke with Union Bag and Paper slumping \$9. Celanese followed with a decline of \$10, and recessions of \$3 to \$6 were soon recorded by other leading stocks.

At the finish Union Bag was off \$5.25 at \$40.25 and Celanese, off \$6 at \$35.50.

The day's share transactions totaled 21,731,51, more than double the aggregate of the previous session. The average for 90 selected issues was off \$1.40 at \$74.

What dropped about three cents a bushel to around its lowest level since Oct. 20, cotton was down 15 to 60 cents a bale and most other commodities were hesitant.

Meanwhile additional witnesses were questioned today by Ambrose V. McCall, assistant state attorney general, in his investigation of the recent activity of the stock of Atlas Tack Corp. on the Exchange. Two officials of the company who were expected to present themselves, did not appear.

McCall said the inquiry has revealed that the large number of telephone calls and telegrams recommending purchase of the stock the day before it dropped \$11.50 a share came from a financial service in Boston. McCall said the offices occupied by this concern were closed when Boston authorities called there yesterday and the telephone had been discontinued.

**Arrested Wearing Forbidden Blue Shirts**

DUBLIN, Dec. 20.—General Eoin O'Duffy, blue shirted co-leader of the United Ireland party, was brought to Arbour Hill Police barracks under a heavy police escort today from Westport, Mayo, where he was arrested Sunday.

Battle lines immediately were started for a hearing tomorrow on his habeas corpus application and it was expected that the wearing of a blue-shirt, a symbol of his anti-De Valera movement, would loom large in the proceedings.

Applications for the writ claimed that wearing a garment of such a color was not an offense under the law.

O'Duffy, Captain John Hooyne, Captain Sullivan, and J. N. Chitry were taken to Westport after clashes between police and the General's followers when, wearing the forbidden blue shirts, the men attempted to address a rally.

**Will Restrict Cattle Imports**

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Canada has voluntarily agreed to the United Kingdom's suggestion she should not export more cattle to Britain in the first quarter of 1934 than in the same period of 1933, while the government will arbitrarily restrict imports of cattle and beef from the Irish Free State and foreign countries.

This was announced by Walter Elliott, Minister of Agriculture, in the House of Commons today when he outlined steps taken by the government to protect the market for the domestic producers, whose already abnormally low returns were being endangered by any large influx from abroad.

**AMERICAN ELK THRIVE IN CANADA**

JASPER NATIONAL PARK, Alta., Dec. 20.—The elk, or wapiti, which the American government presented to Canada in 1920 and which were placed in Jasper National Park have been "carrying on" with the result that the herd has increased to over three thousand.

The United States government also made other donations of elk to Canada as a measure of friendliness. 267 head being placed in other national parks and game reservations in Canada.

**Progress Reported In Mine Disputes**

HALIFAX, Dec. 20.—First indications of progress in negotiations to settle the wage dispute affecting 1,500 miners of the Acadia Coal Company were reported late last night following a long conference between cabinet ministers, representatives of the men and receiver-liquidators of the company.

All parties declined to comment on their conference but indicated progress of some kind had been made and discussions would be continued this afternoon.

Representative of the workers and spokesman for their delegation D. W. Morrison, district president of the United Mine Workers, said the conference had made headway "without reaching any agreement" in the dispute which arose when the workers refused to accept wage reductions ranging from 13 to 20 per cent which the liquidators said were necessary if the Pictou County collieries were to continue in operation.

**Japanese Navy Far Superior To Others, Claim**

LONDON, Dec. 20.—British warships "are definitely inferior" to ships of the same category built and being built by the United States and Japan, said the foreword of the 1933 edition of "James Fighting Ships", narrative English handbook of navies of the world, just published.

"In the United States a well-balanced naval programme has been put in hand—somehow belatedly—to make good a deficiency in cruisers and replace worn out destroyers with the result half a hundred trades outside of ship-building are busy again," the handbook stated.

A study of Japanese "secret construction" features the book, containing 3,000 photographs and illustrations.

"Year by year Japanese battle-ships add to their malignant profile," the work said, commenting it was difficult to see how much better they could carry.

It points out the nominal 8,500 ton Japanese cruiser will carry 15.61 inch guns, although of the new Japanese cruisers in service "their armament is still unknown—a tribute to the secrecy which now enshrouds Japanese construction."

**Newfoundlanders Capture Giant Octopus**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 20.—(C. P. Cable)—Captured by fishermen after a furious battle, a giant octopus was brought to St. John's today from Dildo, Trinity Bay, and put in cold storage. Later it will be sent to the biological station at Bay Bulls.

From the tip of its tail to the tip of the longest tentacle the monster of the sea measures 20 feet. The longest tentacle is 2 feet, the size of a man's arm at the base and resembling a two-inch rope until it broadens, the under side covered with suckers, then tapering to a point.

In the middle of a mass of tentacles is a parrot-like mouth. The whole fish is pure white, and it is attracting much attention.

**Glace Bay Man Will Stand Trial On Murder Charge**

GLACE BAY, N. S., Dec. 20.—Walter Wilkinson was committed today to stand trial in higher court for the murder of his sister-in-law Mrs. William Wilkinson, slain by a rifle bullet as she sat in a neighbor's home almost a month ago.

No witnesses were examined today as Wilkinson appeared briefly before Magistrate A. B. MacChillivray. Wilkinson had been remanded following a preliminary hearing last week at which 19 witnesses gave testimony.

The prosecution's chief witness was Mrs. Daniel McLeod in whose home Mrs. Wilkinson was sitting when a bullet crashed through the window and into her head. The 31-year old war bride had fled a few minutes before from her own home, dressed in only night attire.

**No Information On Third Test Grain Shipments**

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—The officials of the Trade and Commerce Department are without any information relative to the third test shipment of Canadian grain via United States ports to Great Britain. It was stated here tonight that in order to comply with the provisions of the Canada-United Kingdom trade agreement, such grain would have to be purchased, and all particulars of the transaction completed in Canada before the grain qualified for free admission into Great Britain.

If the cargo was diverted from the Great Lakes carried to Buffalo and passed through United States territory to New York, this would not disqualify it from enjoying the benefits of the six cents preference.
