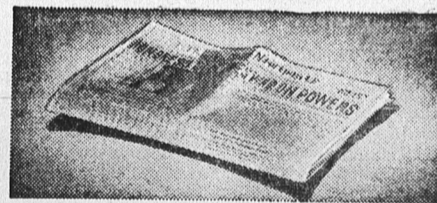

Finance

NEW YORK, March 31—(AP)—The stock market entered March without much of a lion-like march and ended the month today with a good imitation of an alling lamb. Canadian stocks were mixed. McIntyre Mines led the gainers up two points to 30 1-2 and Hiram Walkers gained 3-4 and Hollinger 1-8. Canadian Pacific and Disasters Seagram were unchanged but International Nickel declined 3-8. Imperial Oil eased 1-4 and Lake Shore Mines 1-8. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 2 of a point at 342, a new low for this barometer since March 31, 1938. On the month the composite registered a net drop of 2.8 points, biggest for the year to date. Activity picked up a trifle over yesterday's most sluggish session since last May. Transfers totalled 279,890 shares compared with 229,230 Monday. In the share division American Air Lines was off 1 1-2 points to

a new 1942 bottom. Prominent losers elsewhere included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Great Northern, Chrysler, Texas Co., International Harvester, United Aircraft, Consolidated Edison, American Smelting, Anaconda, General Electric, Union Carbide, Johns-Manville, Eastman Kodak, J.C. Penney and Air Reduction. Profits statements of leading corporations for 1941 were more or less ignored. Boeing Aircraft for instance was off 1-8, although the company reported net for last year of \$5.65 a share against 34 cents in 1940 after heavy write-offs.

NEW YORK, March 31—(CP)—The Canadian dollar eased 1-16 of a cent to a discount of 11 3-16 per cent in today's closing foreign exchange dealings. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.00—9.1 per cent discount.) Other leading foreign currencies including the pound sterling at \$4.08 3-4 were unchanged in relation to the United States dollar.

MONTREAL, March 31—(CP)—Mines and metals rallied today on the stock exchange and curb market but price ranges in other sections were moved irregularly. Hollinger was a firmer spot in mines on the stock exchange after the announcement at the company's annual meeting that Ontario income tax adjustments had enabled it to earn the dividend paid in 1941. Buluo advanced on the strength of better news from the East Indies fighting zone. Noranda and Consolidated Smelters both acquired fractional bits in metals and International Petroleum did better in oils. Dominion Coal preferred worked higher in industrials and Asbestos was also stronger. Canadian Corporation "A" took losses and Bath-

urst moved uncertainly to wind up in the red. Howard Smith preferred was improved and the common weaker. Total sales: 14,200 shares; Industrials, 8,600; Mines, 8,600.

Livestock

MONTREAL, March 31—(CP)—There were 106 cattle, 15 sheep and lambs, 922 hogs and 2,458 calves for sale on the two Montreal live stock markets today. Calves were 35 to 50 cents higher. Other kinds of livestock steady. Butcher cows ranged from 65 to 88. Canners and cutters were \$4.50 to \$6. Common bulls \$6 to \$7.50. Veal calves were 25 to 50 cents higher than Monday's quotations. A few medium good to good veals made \$12 with medium from \$10.50 to \$11.50. The bulk of the calves were sold in mixed lots between \$8.75 and \$9.25. Very common light veals were down to \$8. Drinkers were \$6.50 to \$8. A few fair to medium quality spring lambs were sold between \$5 and \$7 each. Common light spring lambs were not wanted. Hogs were steady at \$15.25 to \$15.50 for B-1 dressed. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off weights. Sows were \$8.50 to \$9.50 live weight. Minard's kills pain.
