It will be the second Sunday in Advent, the Church's Bible Sunday. The Rector in his address to the boys and girls carried them in imagination to London and the great Bible House over whose portals is the text "Heaven and earth shall pass away but my word shall not pass away." In the museum there lies a little worn Bible which once belonged to Mary Jones, the little girl whose efforts to secure it were the means which led to the founding of the British and Foreign Bible Society. The Rector pointed out that in God's sight boys and girls may be of great importance in the extension of His Kingdom.
