Fair Debutante Aids Unemployment Ills

I have just met the girl who could cure most of the unemployment ills and deprivations in Britain, writes Winifred Loraine. She is the Hon. Eve Chetwynd, daughter of Viscount Chetwynd. At the debutante age of seventeen she lost her mother and, turning aside from gaiety, settled down to keep house for her father and young brothers. She has a flair for making use of everything. Beside her the most thrifty housewife would seem wasteful. The bed-quills at Brook End Farm, Lord Chetwynd's Queen Anne manorhouse, near Hertford, are made of sheep's wool picked off the hedges during country walks, washed at home, and quilted by Eve Chetwynd. She has just opened a children's dressmaking salon on the top floor of the house. Models are all designed, cut out, superintended, finished, and ironed by Mary D'ana Eve Chetwynd. "I'd not scallop the hem of this frock," she told me, referring to a model remarkable for the unstinted time and labor spent on its finishing, "because no mother would be able to let it down. My prices are cheap because I have no overhead expenses and I do the work myself." She sews until 2 a. m. during rushes, and then goes out with a storm lamp up the hill to the chicken house. Weaking chicks she brings into the manor sitting-room, wraps each one in flannel, and sits before the fire with them all night, pushing food into their beaks with a match stick. "Let me find you a new laid egg for tea," she said, and led the way to the hen-house. This girl is 24 dark and bonny. The eggs had just been cleared, but there was one hen sitting on the straw. "Get up," she said to it, adding: "People who don't know think a hen lays sitting, whereas it always stands." She put out her hand, and the hen stood up and laid an egg into it. **PRACTICAL SENSE** Eve Chetwynd has the artist's eye for suiting color to line, but her practical sense never deserts her. "Blue Danube" is a picture velvet frock, "Sugar Candy" an angelica green house smock, and to add the final touch of individuality to these models, they can never be repeated—they are made of remnants.

They are especially easy to use because they require no preliminary soaking as do most of the other dried fruits. An excellent source of natural sugar, the sweetness of raisins decreases the amount of sugar usually called for in a recipe. They add much to the diet in other ways, increasing the palatability of many plain dishes and furnishing iron to a high degree. Their caloric value, being almost 100 calories per ounce, is also important. One fourth cup of raisins weighs 1.1 ounces and supplies 3 calories of protein, 9 of fat and 88 of carbohydrates. Most of us use raisins in puddings and cake mixtures, but do you know that hot boiled beets gain interest and provide extra nourishment if served with a sauce to which raisins have been added? The small seedless raisins are delicious in either a lemon or an orange sauce. The flavour of Hamburg steak is greatly improved by the addition of a few raisins. Chop raisins finely and work well with meat. Although the protein content of raisins is vastly lower than that of beef, their iron content compares favorably and they are inexpensive and highly nutritious. Other meats beside beef are made more appetizing if combined with raisins. Raisin sauce with ham is traditional, but seeded or seedless raisins can be sprinkled over the ham while baking with excellent effect. Hot boiled tongue with raisin sauce, and braised beef liver with raisin sauce are inexpensive and worth-while meat dishes that owe much of their popularity to the sauce. Bread puddings and rice puddings become the means of adding iron to the diet when raisins are included in their composition. The next time you serve rice in place of potatoes try the following raisin sauce. **Raisin Sauce** One cup white sauce, 1-2 cup grated cheese, 1-2 cup seeded and steamed raisins. Wash raisins and steam until plump. Add cheese to hot white sauce and when melted add raisins. Keep hot over hot water if not served at once. **CULLING THE FLOCK OF SHEEP** With the lambing season on, or coming on, and with shearing not very far away, the farmer comes in more or less contact with the individual members of his flock, and a little close attention at these times in tagging individuals for culling is well worth while. Udder troubles are fairly common and show up most prominently following lambing. Udders that give trouble one season in all probability will give more trouble the next, and in most cases these ewes should be tagged for disposal. Ewes that fail to conceive should also be marked for early disposal unless, due to the large number of failures, the ram is indicated as being at fault. Certain ewes make much better mothers than others and if notes or records are kept of this it will also assist in selecting individuals for culling. Some ewes are wild and flighty and a continual source of nuisance. The disposal of these may add greatly to the peace of the flock. At shearing time a close observer will be able to make good selection of various individuals as to breed type and to quality of the wool. While wool prices are low it is all the more important to try and improve the quality and quantity, and a great deal of information in this respect can be gathered at shearing time. In the shearing flock of Hampshire at the Dominion Experimental Station at Windermere the

range in weight of fleeces ran from 8.5 pounds to 15 pounds with the average weight being 10.8 pounds. At prices received in 1932 for the wool there was a difference of approximately 45 cents in value between the high and the low fleece. While feeding has an influence on the quantity and quality of the wool, breeding and selection are undoubtedly the biggest factors, and a great deal may be done by culling ewes with poor fleeces, and by using rams with outstanding qualities in this regard. At shearing time the quality of the fleece can be most readily observed and selections made accordingly. Black hair and wool are some of the most undesirable features, while length, density, quality and lustre are important considerations. In time of adversity it is all the more important that farmers by breeding and selection should improve the quality of their product, and this selection is possibly most easily made at lambing and at shearing time. **MINARD'S LINIMENT stops dandruff** **AUCTION SALE** The sale of Mr. W. radio is now possible, declare the European inventors of a new device. The apparatus now being exhibited is only a few inches square and may be used by every telephone subscriber as a transmitter or a receiver for written messages. One wire of the instrument is exposed for connection with the bell wire of the telephone. Inside the apparatus is a small type-writer of only one key, and a revolving drum on which letters of the alphabet are arranged in suitable formation. A person may tap out the required letters with this drum, and these are tapped automatically on a tape at either end of the telephone wire. It is declared the instrument would be made prof.
