

# Richard Is Star As Canoeists Tie Leafs 4-4

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—They opened the door for Richard three times and the "Rocket" skated through to score three goals as Montreal Canadiens thrashed a hapless Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night in a 4-4 tie which left the National League title chase unaltered.

Usually a fizzle on Toronto ice, Maurice Richard unleashed the explosive power which has rocketed him to the position of hockey's most prolific marksman. His hat-trick scoring effort left the Canadiens six points in the lead of the second-place Leafs, who have two games in hand.

Penalties played an important part in the match during which 14,358 fans saw four of the eight goals scored while opposing players watched from the cooler. But the world champions were at full strength when the young Leafs tied two goals in a minute and scored a third in the third period to split the points.

The contest developed almost into a battle of two attacking forces. Montreal's "punch" line accounting for all their goals and the threesome centred by Ted Kennedy counting three of the Leafs' four markers.

Loudest cheer of the evening, however, went to Spl Apps, who pushed home the tying goal with five minutes play remaining. The Toronto captain batted down a Leafs puck with his hand and as touched the ice his stick directed the rubber between goalie Bill Durnan's legs.

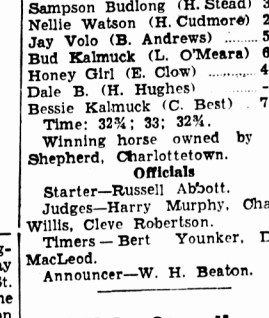
