—APPEAL TO HARDING.—The Russian Soviet government has appealed to President Harding and the United States government to resume trade relations with Russia, says a wireless message from Moscow. The Soviet government proposes to send a delegation to the United States to negotiate agreement, the message adds.

—CONTINUE THE \$250 REQUIREMENT.—An order in council just passed by the Canadian government extends indefinitely the provisions of an order passed last November, whereby immigrants of mechanic, artisan or laborer classes, whether skilled or unskilled are required to be in possession of two hundred and fifty dollars on landing in Canada in addition to a ticket to their destination. This regulation, it is officially stated does not apply to farmers, farm laborers, or household workers, nor yet to the wives and minor children of persons legally resident in Canada.

### Our Ottawa Letter

OTTAWA, Mar. 22—1921—With the customary procession of academic topics practically disposed of, parliament is beginning to gain momentum in disposing of the real work of the session. Estimates are now before the House, supply being voted with despatch Wednesday night sittings will be inaugurated next week and the government's legislative program including the budget, are to be brot on as speedily as a necessary caution permits. The railway question continues to be the most important topic of the day. The annual statement of the National railways presented by Dr. Reid emphasized the difficulty of the situation which had been indicated by the railway estimates. Briefly, it showed that the past year produced a deficit on operating and fixed charges of some seventy millions, this not including fixed charges on the Transcontinental and Intercolonial, which is about thirteen millions more; and the loss on the Grand Trunk, shortly to be acquired, is still to come. The abnormal cost of labor and supplies is offered by the manager as explanation of the great deficit. It points out that for every dollar that the roads earned 75 cents had to be paid out in wages and 20 cents for fuel, leaving five cents to provide all other necessities which amounted to 29 cents. In other words it cost the railways one dollar and twenty four cents to earn a dollar; a fact which has resulted in the curious paradox that the more the roads earned, the more they lost.

The minister of railways had a remedy to suggest. Like most men of sense he realizes that there is no short cut out of our railway difficulty and so instead of trying to blur over the true situation with a lot of optimistic platitudes, he dealt merely in cold facts and asked the House to discuss them frankly and fearlessly.

### To Reorganize Board.

What the immediate outcome will be, it is not easy to say. There is however, reason for believing that the present board of directors is to be reorganized. It is not that the management is blamed for the poor showing that has been made; on the contrary it is agreed that Mr. Hanna and his associates have performed a task of great magnitude creditably. But with the taking over of the Grand Trunk, new problems will be created. There will be need for new and vast adjustments for the ruthless elimination of duplications and for other reforms, and it is known that the government believes that these tasks should be committed to a new board. And so it is understood that an effort is being made to secure the services of the greatest railway operators that money can secure, the government realizing that the situation is one which challenges the very brains of the highest character.

### Civil Service Changes.

Legislation modifying the present Civil Service act is expected shortly. There is no intention of returning to party patronage—the ancient cry "to the victor belongs the spoils" is buried forever but it is realized that the act of 1917 under which manual laborers in far-off districts are supposed to pass a merit test is impracticable. Moreover, experience has shown that the new system has not effected economy because whilst the cost of civil service, inside and outside—was 22 millions in 1911, it was no less than sixty millions in 1920. Then again there is much to be said for the claim that members of parliament, largely responsible to the electorate for the fallure or success of public administration, ought to have some voice in appointments to the service, especially in the matter of direction. Nor are agrarians led by Mr. Cramer much more aggressive. The National Progressives, as they persist in calling themselves, are sorely handicapped by a lack of knowledge of parliamentary procedure, and therefore by lose many opportunities of presenting the views of their party upon the problems to be dealt with
