Waterloo Bridge To be Converted

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(C.P.)—Plans for the reconditioning and widening of Waterloo Bridge, at an estimated cost of \$3,425,000, have been adopted by the London County Council. It is proposed to convert the present three-carriage-way bridge (27 feet six inch roadway) into a four-way bridge (36 feet roadway) by "corbelling-out" or widening the bridge by a "covered trize" treatment, but without any alteration of the main lines of the bridge, the piers, arches and waterways remaining as at present. The scheme, prepared by the Council's architect, has received the approval of the Royal Fine Arts Commission and also the Ministry of Transport.

IN MEMORIAM

ISLANDER PASSES AWAY AT COTTONWOOD, KANSAS

There passed away at Cottonwood Falls, Kansas, on October 12th, Mr. Henry Bishop, a native of this province, in his 93rd year. About 50 years ago the late Mr. Bishop served on the Summerside police force and will be favorably remembered by many of the older residents. He was born in Murray Harbor and was a shipbuilder by trade and before joining the police force he worked in the shipyards of Summerside in the days of wooden ships and iron men. In 1887 he, with his wife and family went west and located for a time in Kansas City, Mo., but later removed to Cottonwood Falls, Kansas. The late Mr. Bishop was twice married, his first wife, nee Annabel McLeod of this province, passed away about 35 years ago. While living in his native province he was a member of the Church of Scotland, and after coming to Kansas he united with the Methodist Church where he has been a constant, faithful attendant, while his health permitted. He was possessed of a deep and abiding faith which was the support of his declining days. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. H. C. Wadsworth and Mrs. C. W. Cunningham, both of Cottonwood Falls, and five grandchildren.

The remains were forwarded from Plymouth to Prince Edward Island for interment, accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. MacLean, and attended to in Charlottetown by N. D. MacLean, undertaker.

The funeral was held from Mr. Philip Acorn's home, Bridgetown, on Sunday, Nov. 28th, and was largely attended. The service at the house and grave was conducted by Rev. Alex. Firth, minister of the United Church, Dundas, where the deceased worshipped for some years, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Grey of the Baptist Church. The interment was in the old cemetery in Dundas (Acorn's) beside his beloved wife and daughter Anna who passed away about twenty-five years ago.

Canadian Store Cattle

Canadian store cattle are well liked in Scotland, says the Canadian Trade Commissioner. They are strong and healthy and feed up after a few weeks' keep. The type of animal in most demand is a young bullock approaching two years of age, from 8 to 9 hundred weight, and of good class and breeding. Aberdeen-Angus or the Shorthorn crosses are preferred. Herefords are not so well liked in the Scottish market, possibly because this breed of animal is not indigenous to Scotland, and can never be sold later as "Scottish beef."

Unfinished Hogs

All unfinished hogs offered at stockyards and packing plants, such as do not conform to the requirements of the grading regulations, are graded as feeders, and, says the Live Stock Market Report, it is in the interests of the producers to make every effort to hold back hogs of select bacon and bacon weights, until they are properly finished. Underfinished pigs make soft bacon and poor cuts and roasts.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(C.P.)—Here is a story of a man with a remarkable memory:

During the war there was a man serving in the New Zealand Expeditionary Force who claimed he could remember the names and number of every other soldier in his battalion. This was the chance for him to prove his claim, and he supplied the commanding officer with not only the name and number of every man who was killed in the explosion, but he also gave the names and addresses of their next-of-kin entirely from memory.

This man is Dr. A. C. Aitken, a Professor at the University at Edinburgh, and it is claimed for him that he is at present the "world champion lightning calculator." The story of Dr. Aitken's remarkable wartime experience was told by Dr. L. J. Comrie at a dinner in London of the graduates of the University of New Zealand.
