## GERMAN GOVERNMENT WILL RECALL VON DER GOLTZ FROM THE BALTIC

Because of his Alleged Inability to Remove German Troops. This Recall will not be Accepted by Supreme Council and Economic Pressure will be Continued until German Troops are Removed.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 1.—The efforts of General von der Goltz to make his troops evacuate the Baltic having failed, says a Berlin despatch received here today, the German government has decided to recall him definitely. Germany's recall of General von der Goltz from the Baltic region will not satisfy the supreme council, it is asserted, the council being determined to place economic pressure on Germany until all the German soldiers are withdrawn from the Baltic. The German soldiers at present in this re-

gion are variously estimated at from 50,000 to 100,000. They apparently are determined to restore the old Russian regime there.

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—The great wooden von Hindenburg monument which during the war was studied by the populace with nails representing so much money will be demolished this week according to the Vossische Zeitung.

## GIBBS AMONG RUINS OF YPRES MARVELS AT UNHEALED GASH

YPRES, Oct. 1.—There are tears in the heart of the man who goes on a pilgrimage now across the battlefields of Flanders to the city of wooden huts in the ruins of Ypres, if he knew those places when they were fighting grounds for the great army of youth, when every huddle of bricks, every crossroad, every bank of earth, every group of dead trees, every concrete fort in the sea of shell craters, was a landmark of that desperate conflict lasting for years hereabouts, in which hundreds of thousands of British soldiers fell with their mortal wounds.

There are many British graveyards in France. In these recent days I have passed them again, where their wooden crosses rise out of the sterile earth. If ere in the country around Ypres on both sides of the Menin Road, is the greatest of all England's grave yards, for it is all one great grave in which the flower of her boyhood fell in the devouring flame of that hell which was Flanders.

From the ramparts of Ypres to the east of Passchendaele and the low country beyond to-day, when I went over that country again, the vision of all that drama that I had seen there surged back to me, the traffic of armies, the fields of dead, the never ceasing labor of guns, until one day by a kind of miracle they ceased, and all was quiet at last, as now, when it is strangely and enormously quiet.

### Old Familiar Noise

Once only today the silence over this desert land was broken by an old familiar noise. There was a loud rending explosion and to the right of a hummock of earth there rose curly clouds of black and white smoke, high into the sky. It was like the bursting of a 12-inch shell.

"What on earth is that?" asked a man on the Menin Road.

A French peasant answered him: "They are exploding old shells which they have collected in dug-outs. Every yard of this ground is strewn with them."

He pointed to piles of 4.2's and 9-inch shells neatly heaped along the roadside. I had noticed thousands of them lying around on the way down from Morslede, by Passchendaele, and everywhere there were notices warning people not to disturb the shells which are "dangerous in this district."

Over by Sanctuary Wood there was a big fire burning. It was a bon-fire of that brown, tussocky grass which has grown high over all these fields where nothing grew when I knew them in the years of the war; and that brought back pictures of the time when that same place was ravaged by German shells. Otherwise the wide vista of old battlefields bounded by the purple haze on far ridges like that of Messines and old Kemmel Hill, was tranquil and motionless, with nothing stirring but a few human ants prowling in old places of strife.

This long, wide belt of Flanders is a wound that remains unhealed, and the earth is branded by the mark of Cain. Nothing grows there. There

are no leaf spouts on the stumps of trees that rise hideously out of the rigid waves of shell holes. The land is blasted where the trail of war passed over it, and it is still one vast desert, haunted by innumerable ghosts.

### Enormity of Crime

Standing here alone in silence, with five years' memory, one is stricken by the enormity of the crime that was done here and by this deep gashed imprint of human tragedy. The earth itself asks the mercy of God for the outrage that has deflowered it.

Here and there in the midst of the battlefields in their loneliness some people have come back "home"; that is to say, with a courage which I find wonderful have put up little shanties against the walls of German pillboxes and above the mine craters and shell craters where once they tilled the good fields. There is a small colony of tents near Gheluvelt, where the 5th and 7th British Divisions had their illad in the adventure of death. They are dotted about below Polygon Wood and along the Menin Road, by Hooge, where year after year gentlemen of England lived in lousy ditches with mineshafts unopened and every kind of shell and boom above them.

On the edge of the desert before I went up toward Passchendaele from the flat country on the Menin side I came across a little scene which was fantastic in its aspect, like a poet's dream. It was among the ruins of Dadizeel; all its houses are wrecked, and its old Flemish church with its high spire that one sees from Passchendaele is tattered and torn.

But today its doors were flung wide open, and out of them down the highway of the nave came into the glare of sunlight a pageant led by priests and monks and village maidens. The children were dressed in white silk with long trains and wore little golden crowns. Behind them came taller girls, crowned also above their flowing hair, and with green velvet robes above white embroidered gowns. They were like mediaeval princesses, like those to whom the Flemish troubadours made their songs when Baldwin was Count of Flanders and the world was young. The children carried flowers before them and four princesses carried a statue of "Our Lady of Dadizeel." And so they wound their way through the ruins of their village, where not a house stands unbroken or unburned except some wooden houses newly built.

### Tended by Peasants

In a small cemetery nearby lie the bodies of some British soldiers who fell a year ago. Flowers are growing on their graves, and Flemish peasants tend them every day.

"Sir," said one of them, "it is our sacred duty to guard the graves of your young soldiers as though they were our own brothers."

That was on the edge of the old battlefields, and from Dadizeel I went into the wilderness, and came again after many miles to the Menin Gate, between the ramparts of Ypres, and saw again that city of ghosts. The water in the canal is almost dried up, and the filth of those years clogs it. The rags and tatters of the Cloth Hall and the Cathedral stand rather higher than the other rubbish heaps. No labor of love may restore the city of Ypres. It will be a new city that rises there, and that is not yet begun.

There are many people in Ypres, and at the very gate through which the British troops used to go on their way to Hooge there are now crowds of women and children, selling picture postcards of their own ruins to tourists in motor cars and pilgrims afoot, outside restaurants and cafes and booths like those at a country fair. There is some thing that shocks one's mind in this, if one knew Ypres in the time of war and reason reasserts itself over weak emotion and says: "This is good. This is life. This is revival after death."

There is one big hotel, built of wood, but spacious and even elegant, called the Splendid Hotel, surrounded by many little "barques," and in this I had a luncheon at a cost of seven francs, better, I think than one could get in Paris for twice that sum. The proprietor talked to me

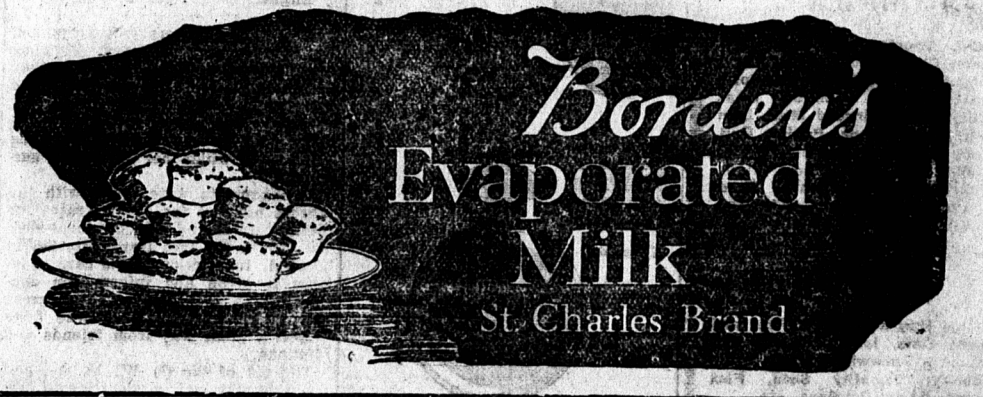

and explained the difficulties of Monday does not arrive in Ypres until Saturday, and it is impossible to get in France, as the customs delays are insuperable. Other people to whom I talked in Ypres were discouraged by the utter lack of help from the Government, from which as yet they received no

indemnities for all their losses and no advance by which they might build up a little, and no material with which to build. The Government seems powerless to aid them because of the great ruin of Belgium and the lack of reparation from Germany for all that destruction.

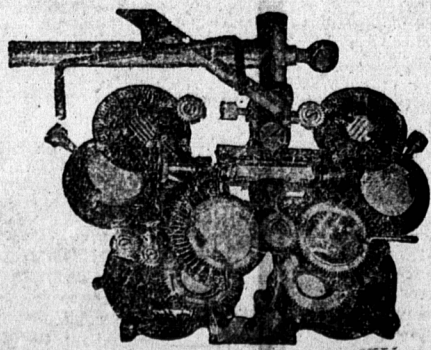
