Education Expenses

Congratulations were extended by Mr. McIntyre to the Minister of Health and Education on the establishment of the High School at Summerside. There was however a possibility that the Minister might go too far. As he had himself said, the more improvements one makes, the larger the expense bill becomes. "I am afraid if the Minister is not careful he will be termed—as I was—extravagant," Mr. McIntyre warned. He was also afraid that education "would get all the money and there would be nothing left for public works and highways." Already it was necessary to appoint two extra professors in Prince of Wales College. He would like to know what the Minister estimated the cost of education to be since the latter took over the department of Health and Education. It certainly must cost a lot more than under the Liberal Government.

HON. DR. MACMILLAN: "Would my

hon. friend permit a question? Does he think that we should not have appointed those two teachers? Mr. McIntyre: "When you created the departments for them, necessarily you had to appoint them." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "We did not create any departments at all. The reason they were appointed was that there were 120 more pupils in Prince of Wales College this year than last year, and that the staff were teaching on an average of thirty periods
