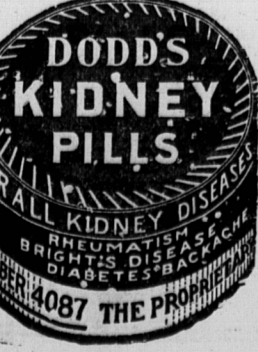

GEORGETOWN SCHOOL—The weekly meeting of the teaching staff of the Georgetown and Royalty schools was held in the Principal's Department of the G. H. S. on Tuesday afternoon at half past three. PRODUCE LADEN—The schooner Silver Bell, Capt. Gerrior, was the first vessel to load produce in Montague this fall, loading a small cargo of potatoes for Trenton W. S. McLeod and McGregor being the shippers. The schooner Sea Foam has commenced loading a large cargo of oats and potatoes for the owner Mr. Sydney McIntyre and will sail shortly for the New Glasgow Market. Both these vessels will make several trips during the fall. The schooner Argo, Capt. Murphy, is ready to begin loading for Sydney and will return with coal. Several Newfoundland vessels have arrived and will be given despatch. Produce is beginning to move more freely and from all reports the crop both oats and potatoes will be only an average one. Oats have advanced to fifty-five cents, and potatoes are going at only thirty
