TO ATTEND MANOEUVRES.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Aug. 3.—According to present arrangements the King is expected to stay at Cambridge for the last four days of the general manoeuvres from September 16 to September 20. A cavalry brigade, consisting of the composite regiment of Household Cavalry, the Scots Greys, and another regiment, is expected to leave Windsor about September 3 and to execute an elaborate scheme of reconnaissance on its way to the Fen country. The march is likely to be especially interesting, as a system of billeting at the halting-places—Chesham and Biggleswade—is being arranged.

LIFE SAVING CONFERENCE.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Aug. 3.—Following the report of Lord Mersey on the loss of the steamer Titanic, Sidney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, has appointed a committee of experts, headed by Professor John Harvard Bales, Vice-President of Institution of Naval Architecture, to advise with him in the interest of the saving of life at sea. The Daily Telegraph's Brussels correspondent says that Holland has decided to convene a conference of the Powers to elaborate universal rules for making life safe at sea.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC.

(Special to The Guardian.) GENEVA, Aug. 3.—In the summer months the Swiss papers contain a large number of alluring advertisements for young girls who are offered splendid places in Spain, Hungary, Argentina, South Africa, etc. Side by side these advertisements may be read the warning of the Federal Department of Justice and Police to the Swiss girls not to accept a place without full inquiries. Not only the police, but the Swiss homes in the chief towns in Europe and America, besides several women's societies, undertake inquiries gratuitously on behalf of the Swiss girls going abroad.

In spite of these institutions and notices many Swiss girls are lured away by the international white slave gang, which, like an octopus, has feelers in every large Swiss town. There are at present many advertisements in the Swiss papers for waitresses in Spain at high salaries, but the Swiss Consuls report that only men are employed in Spanish cafes. Another recent example is that of a well-educated Swiss governess "ganged," trapped in Egypt, where her "employer" gave her jewelry and dresses, and then presented a large bill with an ultimatum. The girl's relations and friends subscribed the sum and saved her from a life of shame. Unfortunately, the penalties in Europe in connection with the white slave traffic consist in fines only, which are promptly paid, and the persons implicated disappear, to be replaced by other agents of the gang.

WOMAN'S LEAGUE INTERFERE.

(Special to The Guardian.) ODHSSA, Aug. 3.—The Woman's Rights League is just now keenly interesting itself in a somewhat extraordinary episcopal orator dictum of Bishop Antonius of Volhynia. This pronouncement practically creates an additional cause upon which an orthodox Russian may base a plea for divorce from his non-orthodox wife. Names are not mentioned, but it appears that a couple of years ago an orthodox resident in the Government of Volhynia, in virtue of the "freedom of religious confession" clause in the Imperial Manifesto of October 30, 1905, recanted his faith, and joined the Roman Catholic Church. He subsequently married a Polish lady, recently, repenting his "perversion," he again recanted and was readmitted a member of the State Church. He sought to persuade his wife to become pravoslavni (orthodox) but she firmly refused. On this ground he now seeks for a divorce, and Bishop Antonius ex officio supports his suit, formally and publicly declaring that the cause assigned is legitimate and valid.

The Woman's Rights League is taking steps to have the case brought before the Senate, and will also have it laid before the Holy Synod. As, however, divorce procedure in this country, is still partially governed by the ecclesiastical authority, it is not at all improbable that the Holy Synod will uphold the action of Bishop Antonius. The State Church differentiates between the letter and the spirit of the "freedom of religious confession," promulgated in the Imperial Ukase referred to. It was formerly a criminal offence for an orthodox Russian to abandon his faith, and was punishable by imprisonment or banishment.
