J., June 20—Primo Carnera, the big bankrupt from Italy, gambled happily about under the trees of his training camp today, technically in contact with his sparring partners but actually doing little that was impressive in preparation for his 15-round title chance against Jack Sharkey, June 29.

Freed of financial worries through legal appeal to the law, the vast Venetian put his fists to work today for six rounds of punching with Harold Mays, Bayonne, N. J., heavyweight, Les Kennedy, of California, and a clowning negro named Umberto Arsi, labelled the champion of Porto Rico.

On the basis of the day's efforts the assembled experts, as far as they could see his chances against Sharkey, promptly petitioned him into fistic bankruptcy.

## Browning Wins Wrestling Match

MONTREAL, June 20—Wrestling fans were treated to the spectacle of two extra falls in the scheduled three-fall wrestling match between Jim Browning, of Verona, Mo., and Joe Malcewicz, of Utica, N. Y., here last night. Browning was the winner.

After each had got a fall Malcewicz had Browning pinned to the mat when the timekeeper rang the bell and he let go his hold. It happened the referee had been tripped and lying prostrate on the mat did not see the fall and he ordered the bout to continue. Browning soon got another fall and was awarded the match but the crowd howled.

A couple of spectators started to fight and a mob milled around the ring refusing to leave the arena. To restore peace a meeting of the Athletic Commission was hurriedly summoned and the bout was ordered to continue when Browning got his third and winning fall.

A third manager and one-time protege of McGraw, Bill Terry of the Giants, will hold down first base for the All-Stars and probably serve as field captain.

## FEW UPSETS MARK SECOND ROUND TOURNEY

### "Sandy" Wins Decisively Despite Rain and Thunder Storm.

HOYLAKE, England, June 20—(C.P. Cable)—The weeding-out process began in earnest as the big field battled the elements in the British Amateur Golf Championship today. When the day's struggles in rain, thunder and lightning had been completed over the sodden Hoylake Links the Canadian contention had been whittled from seven men to three, the United States from six to four.

But there were few upsets as the second round was completed and a start made on the third. Despite the miserable weather conditions C. Ross Somerville of London, Ont., the U. S. amateur titleholder, shot sub-par golf for the most decisive victory of the day. Cyril Tolley and Roger Wethered, crack British amateurs, passed their tests and Jack McLean, the Scottish champion, also progressed along with George T. Dunlap of the United States.

Along with "Silent Sandy" Canada still has Jack Nash, Somerville's clubmate, and Brig-General A. C. Critchley, native of Calgary and French amateur champion, in the fray. Somerville cake-walked into the fourth round with an eight and seven triumph over W. H. Sharpe, of Dunbar, taking 42 strokes for the 11 holes played.

Brig-General Critchley won his second-round match over Rex Crumack of the Royal and Ancient four and three. Nash, who won two matches, did not play today but tomorrow he has a tough hurdle in the person of Lionel Munn, Irish veteran who got as far as the semi-finals a year ago and more than once has won the Irish Closed Title.

Two more Canadians and one more United States player joined the defending title-holder, John De Forest, among the spectators today and William Sutton, prominent English amateur, also went to the gallery after losing to the little-known J. W. Jones at the 19th hole.

## Promises To Be Big Threat At Bisley

PORTSMOUTH, England, June 20—Miss Margaret Foster, only woman ever to win the famous King's Prize at the National Rifle Association's historic meetings at Bisley, has served notice she will be a big threat again in the Bisley meeting next month.

In the Hampshire County rifle championship here, over the weekend Miss Foster captured the prize after a shoot off with another King's Prize winner, Captain C. H. Vernon.

Miss Foster and Miss Badcock, her partner in a chicken farm near Bisley, are well known to the crack Canadian marksmen who have just sailed for the Bisley meeting. The former qualified for the King's Prize competition by having driven an ambulance in the Great War, the shoot being open only to past or present members of His Majesty's forces.

## WINNIPEG'S MILKY WAY WITH RED TRIMMINGS IS BANNED BY POLICE

WINNIPEG, June 20—When a Main Street theatre advertised for a red-headed woman to sit in front of the theatre in a bathtub to advertise a motion picture, seven fiery-headed ladies presented themselves for the job, but among them was a policewoman, who raised official objections to a nude woman sitting in a bathtub on the street. Even when theatre officials explained it was intended to have the woman clad in a white bathing suit, police turned down the scheme on the ground that the display would block traffic on the thoroughfare.
