Hearing On Power Rates For O'Leary

The Public Utilities Commission held a sitting in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, Summerside, yesterday afternoon to receive submissions from the Town regarding the cost of producing electric energy which it has undertaken to supply the village of O'Leary and vicinity. The Commission will set the rate to be charged at a later date. The energy will be sold in a block to a Government commission which will be in charge of the distribution. Summerside will produce the power at Mount Pleasant and it will be conducted the rest of the way on Government-operated lines. The line from Mt. Pleasant to O'Leary is now in course of erection by the Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. The poles are all installed and it is expected that it will take another week to string the lines. The need for energy at O'Leary resulted from a fire last winter that destroyed the Champion diesel electric plant. Power, since that time, has been generated by a temporary plant supplied through the Government.

The Public Utilities Commission consists of Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, W. R. Brennan and L. B. MacMillan. The Town was represented by Mayor J. F. Arnett and all the members of the Council, also the Town Clerk, J. H. Strong, and the engineer of the electric light L. W. Hacker. Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, manager of the Maritime Electric Co., Charlottetown, was among others present.

standard of social security and human welfare which assures the greatest possible measure of social justice to all." A new Liberal Government would consult the Province to work out jointly a method to amend Canada's constitution to wipe out a final taint upon her sovereignty. The party aimed at complete recognition of Canadian nationhood and development of all aspects of national life. A bill to make the Supreme Court of Canada, instead of the Privy Council, the last court of appeal, would be introduced. This bill was brought in at the last session but was not passed. In a coast-to-coast political free time broadcast over the CBC and a public address in this railway hub, he asked, in effect, for a renewal of power to allow his party to carry forward aims it already has enunciated, some of them snagged at the Dominion-Provincial conferences which have become a big election issue.

In the Maritimes there are three systems of education, said the report, all secular but tolerating some small degree of Christianity. In Quebec the system is based on "religious classification with a school law which gives a place to religious teaching." The reason may be "dominance of the Roman Church" in Quebec "with the perfectly correct assumption that without religion there can be no true education." The Lord's Prayer and Bible reading is tolerated in the Maritimes, said the report, but religious instruction is not. Quebec syllabi set out aims clearly and simply; Maritime syllabi "seem to be only a concession to the incurable religiosity of their people."

(Continued from Page 1) Campbellton, N. B. Mr. Drew said there is no reason why people living in an area where there is no CBC station should pay a radio licence fee. He repeated a charge that the CBC is a propaganda agency for the government and that it was competing unfairly with private stations. "The government wanted to make sure of effective control over broadcasting stations so that it could color news in its own favor," he said. The CBC, he added, should not have power to control private stations and still compete against them. There should be a separate board with control over broadcasting. There should be a separate agency to control the publicly-owned broadcasting system. Mr. Drew spoke first to a gathering of school children and the public in a mid-town park. Then he moved to the local theatre for the formal meeting. In the park speech he stressed the value of education and mentioned Canada's freedoms. The inscription "lest we forget" on war memorials was a challenge to Canadians to preserve the freedoms that young Canadians went overseas and died for so that they might survive.
