LONDON, Ont., Dec. 1.—Most Rev. David Williams, Archbishop of Huron, will be installed as Metropolitan of the ecclesiastical Province of Ontario at services to be conducted in St. Paul's Cathedral on the evening of Thursday, Dec. 16. Bishop Farthing, of Montreal, will preside at the installation services while the officiating clergy will be Bishop Sweeney, of Toronto, senior officiant; Bishop Roper, of Ottawa; Bishop Seager, of Ontario, and Bishop Owen, of Niagara.

CARDINALS TO RECEIVE \$1,600 A YEAR NOW

ROME, Nov. 30.—Pope Pius today doubled the salaries of members of the College of Cardinals. The Cardinals will now receive 40,000 lire a year, approximately \$1,600. Last week the Vatican announced that gardeners and other employees of the Vatican heretofore would be paid at a rate six times greater than before the war.

VESUVIUS AROUSED NEW ERUPTION CONE

NAPLES, Italy, Dec. 1.—Vesuvius is again aroused. Lava columns six feet deep and two feet in width is flowing from the huge mouth of the crater. The mount resumed violent activities yesterday and the column of steaming molten fluid had last night already attained more than 1,500 metres, destroying all vegetation in its path, and was moving with unusual speed down the side of the mountain. Simultaneously a new eruptive cone, about 200 feet in diameter, was hurling skyward huge masses of incandescent material and showers of heavy flaming cinders.

HISTORICAL GLASS CUP TO BE SHOWN IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Dec. 2.—A glass cup of the first century A. D. which is said to be identical with that passed round the table at the Last Supper, and therefore used by Christ, is to be exhibited, The Westminster Gazette understands, at a lecture which Dr. James Rendel Harris, deans Dec. 15 at Rylands Library, Manchester. It is possible, indeed, says the paper, that this cup may be the actual one that was used, although such possibility would have been stronger if the cup had been found in Jerusalem.

NAVIGATION FACES AN ABRUPT CLOSE

SAULT ST. MARIE, Mich., Dec. 2.—Ice forming in the lower St. Mary's River and Mud Lake is hampering movements of boats and if cold weather continues it may bring the navigation season to an abrupt close. Twenty steamers upbound were scattered in the river between the Soo and Detroit this morning, of which six succeeded in getting through to the locks. This afternoon the ice was from two to six inches in thickness. Wrecking operations on the steamers are in trouble due to last Friday morning's storm having been successful with the exception of the Cottonwood. The Ingalls was released from Big Point at midnight and her lighted cargo is being replaced.

"Y" Workers Civilians, Ruled

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Y. M. C. A. workers during the world war were not "civilians" or "a part of the civilian population of the United States" within the meaning of the Treaty of Berlin, and therefore are not entitled to recovery for damages against Germany for loss of property in the war's prosecution. Overruling the contentions of the American Commissioner, Edwin B. Parker, Empire of the German-American Mixed Claims Commission, here held that the Y. M. C. A. personnel serving with the A. E. F. was "engaged in activities aimed at the direct furtherance of military operations against Germany or her allies."

Eligible for Bonus?

The question immediately arose as to whether the Association workers, in the light of the decision, might not lay claim to benefits under the veterans bonus act. While this point is said never to have been tested in the courts, legal officials of the Veterans Bureau say no such claim could be recognized. The case decided by the claims commission was brought by Arthur H. Hunnerford, an American national, who was recruited by the group of 57 men recruited by the Y. M. C. A. for service with the A. E. F.

The party sailed from New York April 13, 1918, on the British steamer Oronsa, which was sunk by a German submarine in the Irish Channel. All of the 57 workers escaped without personal injury, but lost their personal belongings and alleged claims approximating \$50,000 against Germany for the loss.

Says Were Under Arms. Judge Parker said the Y.M.C.A. personnel "rendered military service of a high order." Regarding Hunnerford's particular case, he said the claimant "exposed not only his own person," but his "property" to the risks of war—"risks to which the general civilian population were not exposed."

Those entitled to benefits of the various veterans' acts are described as any commissioned officer or enlisted man, or any female in the Army and Navy nurse corps "when employed in the active service" under the War or Navy Department. A "veteran" under the bonus act is defined as "any individual, a member of the military or naval forces of the United States at any time after April 6, 1917, and before Nov. 18, 1918."
