His sister, Miss Viola Howatt, who returned with him in December is still visiting him in Colorado.

The funeral of the late Miss Lizzie L. Dawson, Tryon, took place on Saturday, to Tryon cemetery, and considering the state of the roads, was well attended. The pall-bearers were Dr. Boyer, W. B. Leard, Wilfred Boulier, R. H. Leard, W. H. Hood and J. P. Hood. The deceased had selected her own pall-bearers but owing to the storm some were unable to be present and their places had to be filled in by others. The body was removed to the Tryon Methodist church where an exceedingly appropriate and earnest address, from "For me to live is Christ but to die is gain" was given by the pastor, Rev. G. F. Dawson, who paid a fitting tribute to the sterling character and unswerving religious zeal of the late Miss Dawson. She is gone but the remembrance of her kind words and exemplary life remain, comforting and cheering those who knew her best.
