Baby Specialist Is Convicted of Murder



Found guilty of second-degree murder in the knife slaying of Byron C. Hattman, St. Louis electrical engineer, Dr. Robert C. Rutledge, Jr., left, St. Louis baby specialist, is shown leaving courtroom after jury verdict, on way back to cell under guard of Sheriff Jim Smith. The defendant took the verdict calmly and remained impassive. He can be jailed for a term of from 10 years to life at hard labor. The doctor's wife, Mrs. Sydney Rutledge, who was not in court when the killing due to Hattman's attention to her, was not in court when the jury returned. Hattman, alleged seducer of Mrs. Rutledge, was killed by stabbing in a violent fight in a Cedar Rapids hotel room last December.


