Charles R. McKay, a graduate of the Charlottetown Business College, and now manager of the Transit Department, First National Bank Chicago, has a very clever article in the Bankers' Convention Daily on the Numerical System in the Transit Department. J. Stewart, Southport, recently brought action against three young men named, Stewart, McNeill and Trowsdale, of Southport, for rather hilariously boisterous conduct on the King's Highway, much to the annoyance of the plaintiff. The magistrate, after hearing the case, sentenced the three young men to \$1, \$1 and \$3, respectively. The evidence showing Trowsdale to be the most offending of the culprits, hence the greater fine in his case.

The new icebreaker, Earl Grey, bound from Barsow to this port, got into difficulties while in the Atlantic Ocean. Her supply of coal gave out in spite of the extremely economic endeavors of her officers to avoid the inevitable. When off Baccalieu the mate and crew were sent ashore to telegraph for coal. Ten tons were despatched but the heavy sea, made it impossible to transfer the coal on its arrival at the Earl Grey's side. Another tug was then wired for, in addition to the coal, laden on, and the helpless Earl Grey was towed into St John's harbor. The vessel was damaged slightly some guards and the foregigging being destroyed. She took on 200 tons of coal at St John's Nfld and sailed for Charlottetown.

At Southport, Sept 15th, Henry McGregor departed this life in the 59th year of his age. In the removal of Mr McGregor, Southport has sustained a great loss. He was a man of aggressive ideas, of far seeing business ability, of generous and genial spirit, and his memory will long be cherished as one who possessed all the sterling qualities of a prudent husband and father, an obliging neighbour, and a good citizen. He professed religion and united with the old Cross Roads Christian Church, under the ministry of the late Rev Dr Knox, and died in the triumphs of the Christian faith. The funeral on the 16th was very largely attended, evidencing the esteem in which he was held. The services were conducted by his Pastor, Rev Harry S. Erb, assisted by Rev D. McLean. The pall bearers were Hon H. J. Palmer, Edward Chandler, James McCallum, Morton Lane, Reaney Jenkins and James Farquharson. He leaves a sorrowing widow, five sons and four daughters; John Robert of Southport, James, Tuplin of B. C.; Harry of Fort William; Mrs Kendrick of N. S.; Cyrus Roy, Eva, Emily and Louisa at home.

He is athletic and very popular among the boys and young men of his town, and The Guardian has no doubt but what he will receive a cordial, welcome and make many friends among the boys and young men of Charlottetown.

Mrs Elizabeth G. Richmond pleaded not guilty to the charge of murdering Stewart McTavish (a native of Elton P. E. I.) when arraigned Monday afternoon before Judge Henry A. King in the Superior Criminal Court at East Cambridge. Attorney Ralph W. Glogat of Boston was selected by the Court to defend the woman. She conducted the Hotel Florence at No 135 Cambridge street East Cambridge. McTavish, who was an attendant at the State Insane Hospital in Gardiner, was found in her room on the morning of July 22 last, dead from a bullet wound in the head, and with his skull crushed in.
