Mrs. Stillman Replaces Her U. S. Servants

THREE RIVERS, Que., Jan. 14.—Mrs. J. E. Stillman, who was to have returned to Montreal to appear before the International Commission, intended to stay at the Grand Anse for the next three or four days. She will be back in Three Rivers on Monday or Tuesday next, said Mayor Jean Geste of Grand Anse where he has been adding Mrs. Stillman in gathering evidence for her defense.

O'Brien attorney, who has accompanied Mrs. Anne U. Stillman on her quest for witnesses to testify in her favor at the Montreal hearing, arrived in this city today on his way to New York. He said that Mrs. Stillman is staying at her home at Grand Anse, Quebec, and that she will not return to Montreal before next week at the earliest. Their efforts in rounding up witnesses, he said, had been very successful. According to Mr. O'Brien, who left for New York tonight, a conference will be held here some time next week between John P. Brennan, main counsel for Mrs. Stillman; John P. Mack, guardian for young Guy Anne; and George Gordon, Montreal lawyer who has been retained to plead in defendant's interest, and himself. Hugh H. Godin, K. C., Canadian commissioner, announced this afternoon that he would stay the hearing on Saturday indefinitely.

STILL WORKING ON SHANTUNG ISSUE AT WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Directing their efforts to settlement of minor phases of the Shantung dispute while awaiting word from Tokio and Peking regarding compromise proposals submitted by Arthur J. Balfour and secretary Hughes for a solution of the controversy over control of the Tsing Tao-Tsinning railway in the Kao Chou leasehold, the Chinese and Japanese delegates today agreed to the disposition of concessions for extension of the road. The two groups however, failed to reach an agreement concerning the opening of the port of Tsingtao to the commerce of the world on equal terms. Another attempt will be made tomorrow it was announced.

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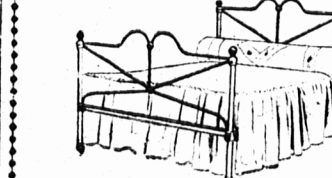

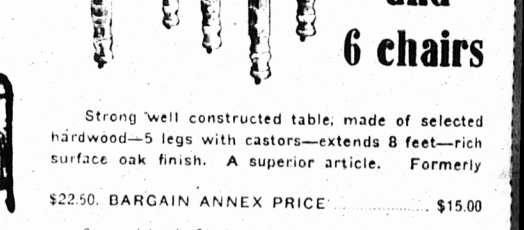

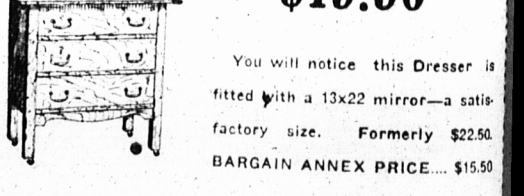
