THE NEXT PRESIDENT.

This is the year of the Presidential election in the United States and to our neighbors that will be the great event of the year. They are now within a few months of the time when the great national conventions will meet and nominate their respective candidates. It is pretty generally conceded that President Roosevelt has by far the best chances of securing the Republican nomination. And yet a large section of his party would prefer some other, if a better man were available. Among those who would prefer another candidate are a number of those who may be called the leaders of the Republican party. But by the death of Senator Hanna the one really dangerous opponent who could have given strength and cohesiveness to the anti-Roosevelt movement within the party was removed.

There is much of the sort of feeling which suspects that Roosevelt is not quite a safe man for the leader of the nation, that he is too ready to depart from the sound traditions of the past, and may by some sudden and unexpected move endanger the nation's peace. These conservative Republicans are not enamored of Roosevelt's imperialism, his militant temper, or the bold and reckless game he played in the Panama affair. But there is no name mentioned in the Republican party that has even a tithe of the chances of securing the nomination which Roosevelt has. The chance by which he may lose will be a strongly divided convention and a "dark horse" selection made as a compromise. This chance is a small one from the present outlook, and it will not be surprising if Roosevelt should win the coveted nomination on the first ballot.

And in the present state of the Democratic party, with no strong and satisfactory candidate in sight, the prospects are that should Roosevelt be the choice of the Republican convention it would be almost equivalent to his reelection. No one can defeat Mr. Roosevelt unless he appeals to large company of votes. He must be a great citizen of moderate views, with a clear record, with noble purpose and committed to American traditions of the better class, a man who can unite the thousands of Republicans who regard Roosevelt as not altogether a safe man. Such a Democratic candidate is desirable, not alone on party grounds, but on national and international grounds as well. But he is not in sight, and present indications point strongly to the re-nomination and re-election of Mr. Roosevelt.

Correspondents who claim to know the conditions along the line of the Siberian Railway tell that Russia's difficulties of transportation will be greater during the month of April. The ice will no longer be safe for the rails now laid across Lake Baikal and yet will still be so heavy as to

impose the greatest obstacles to the ferry steamers, which in the summer season carry the cars across. There is also great trouble with an imperfectly built railway, such as the Siberian road admittedly is, when loaded with heavy traffic at the time the frost is leaving the ground. Even our best and most substantially constructed and ballasted railroads in Canada become rough and uneven at such times, and the condition of the Siberian road must be vastly worse. The Boston Herald estimates that for months to come it cannot carry more than one thousand men a day and the necessary supplies.

ONE FOR MR. STEAD.



BUFFALO, N. Y. March 17.—Thirty girls employed at the Ontario Biscuit Works, Watson street, were thrown into a panic today when a terrific explosion damaged the plant to the extent of \$50,000. Fortunately the stairway remained intact and the girls escaped. It is believed the explosion was caused by a leakage of natural gas, which was used as fuel in the plant.

We have received the annual report of the Superintendent, J. Boyle Travers, M. D. of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum of New Brunswick for 1903. The institution is a large one with 575 inmates. They are housed in two large buildings, the annex being removed about half a mile from the main building. Farming operations are carried on quite extensively, 120 tons of hay nearly 3,000 bushels potatoes, and 3,850 bushels of turnips being produced, besides a vast amount of grain, vegetables and other products for the use of the institution. Dr. Travers is able to report 59 per cent of recoveries on the admissions as against 39 per cent the previous year. This is the largest percentage of recoveries in the history of the institution which extends over fifty years back and is most creditable to the Superintendent and the institution. The total number of patients is also the smallest in three years past. The cost for medical attendance, board and maintenance is \$117.09 per patient for the year.
