THE dimensions of J. K. L. Ross' new yacht, the Gloria, are: Length over all 70 feet; length on water line, 50 feet; beam, 20 feet. She carries a mainsail, gaff topsail, flying jib, baby jib and forestaysail; her sail area is 4000 square ft. She has a crew of three men and can take a number of passengers beside her crew. The Gloria was built in 1888, and sailed across from England to Toronto, where she was owned for a number of years, and then purchased by R. C. McLeod of Halifax, from whom Mr. Ross procured her.—Sydney Post.

THE camp meeting on the beautiful grounds at Tea Hill opened most auspiciously Sunday morning. Fortunately, she was going dead slow, but the impact sufficed to drive the forepart well on the ledge, crushing in the stem plates and filling the forepeak with water. All the forward compartments suffered, water finding its way into the hold. Pumps were at once set going, and it was seen that the water could be kept under, so after some time with full speed astern, she slid off into deep water. The passengers were considerably alarmed at first but on being assured by Captain Sears that the ship was in good condition all fears were allayed. The damage is well below the water line and necessitates the ship going on dock this afternoon. It is fortunate that there was no sea at the time and that the ship's speed was so reduced, otherwise the Restigouche would not now be lying safely moored in this port.—St. John's, N. F. Herald.

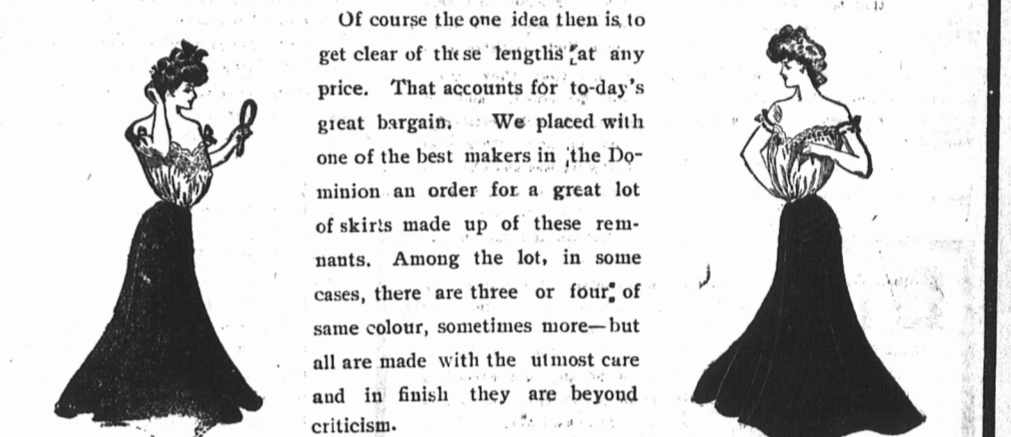
