The bulk of the common cows were from \$4.00 to \$4.50 and canners mostly \$2.00. Bologna bulls were just steady selling from \$5.30 for light yearlings up to \$4.50 for those weighing around 1200 or better. Bulk of Bologna \$4.00 and a few butcher bulls \$5.50. The Abegweits played undoubtedly the hardest game they have played in years the forwards working hard but could not get control of the ball and consequently the back defense were called on for more defensive work than was good for them with the result that when the ball did come their way they were so much used up that their plays invariably resulted in a fumbled ball. On the whole and considering all conditions the game was a good hard contested one from start to finish, the teams dividing about evenly on territory, but when the Mt. A. did get close to the line it was almost sure to end in a try. For the Abbies, Campbell, McCarey, Lynds and McDonald on the three quarter line worked hard while the three halves, Trainers Saunders and J. Connolly put up a great game. James and Morris starrng on the forward line. Although the score was one sided the game was far from being so. even the Mt.
