COMPULSORY VOTING.

Compulsory voting is a moot question in Canada. It is being discussed among the would-be reformers of corrupt practices; it may come before Parliament to be enacted into law. But not all the reformers are in its favor—witness Mr. Dewar whose letter appears in another column of this paper, who, if not so large as Fabian in girth, stands out as stoutly against "compulsion." The fat knight would not render reasons under compulsion, not if reasons were as plentiful as blackberries. Mr. Dewar would not, if he had a thousand votes, give one under compulsion. And yet, despite these weighty authorities it may be worth while to present some reasons for what is called, but is not, compulsory voting. The prime reason why a law of compulsory voting is asked for is because of the "corrupt practice" of bribing an elector to stay at home. We will suppose that Smith and Brown are opposing candidates and Jones is an elector. Jones is not very strong in favor of either Smith or Brown, but it is known that if he goes to the poll he will vote for Smith. Wherefore Brown, or Brown's agent pays him to stay at home. To prevent this form of bribery it is proposed that all qualified voters shall be required by law to record their votes at elections, under the penalty of being disfranchised. This is not a very serious penalty. It is merely the taking away from the elector of a privilege which he will not use in a legitimate way. If he will not vote without being paid for voting, such a law would deprive him of the vote which he values only as a merchantable commodity. It is furthermore contended that what is called compulsory voting would remove that public speck which keeps so many otherwise honest persons from taking part in elections; that rather than be deprived of his vote the individual elector would always go to the polls, and that this would conduce to the public good. Apathy is an underlying cause of corruption. It is also common for a class of dishonest electors to profess indifference, and so prepare the way for being paid by one or the other interested parties to go to the polls. It is common for such persons either before or after going to the polls to suggest that they be paid for the day. Would not compulsory voting operate as a remedy in such cases? We think it would. The voting franchise is a trust, not an inherent right, not a possession that may be sold or bartered, and the state has a just claim upon the elector to see that he makes use of his trust in a lawful manner. Of course, sickness, unavoidable absence or other disability would be admitted as reasonable excuses for not voting. But it may be claimed that an honest elector may be really indifferent as between the candidates offering, or they may be both or all repugnant to him, or he may believe them corrupt, or dishonest, or otherwise such as he ought not to vote for. ABOUT LIFE SAVING STATIONS

Another fatal wreck on our island shores, this time at Alberton, lends painful weight to the demand for life saving stations.

There are twenty-eight of these in Canada one half of which are on the Atlantic coast and in the Bay of Fundy.

The equipment of the average life station is one or more self-righting and self-bailing surf boats, rocket gas and lines, with a crew of one coxswain and six boatmen.

The coxswain is paid a nominal salary of \$75 to \$80 per annum. He and the boatmen are each paid \$2 per drill of 8-10 hours during the months May to November inclusive, with extra pay or rewards when employed at wrecks or saving life.

With fourteen stations in the Maritime Provinces, it is indeed strange that Prince Edward Island has not a single one. This must be remedied.

PURE ELECTIONS ASSOCIATION.

It must be regarded as an event of some importance when a number of prominent citizens meet together and solemnly and earnestly resolve to form an association to promote pure elections. This is what occurred on Thursday evening in this city. The work as foreshadowed somewhat vaguely in the discussion indicates the formation of a provincial organization, with branches in each federal electoral division and subordinate branches in each polling division. We are most hopeful of this movement. It can hardly fail to be educational. Education and agitation are so important in this time of our organization and if this is made general and efficient it ought to do much to prevent the wholesale debauch with whisky and bribe money so prevalent in past elections. Such an organization backed by earnest effort ought also to be fruitful of good in enforcing the election laws we now have, in punishing offenders, and in securing such amendments to the laws as will make it easier to do right and harder to do wrong in future elections. Dr. Jenkins is winning golden opinions for having set the movement on foot.
