ANOTHER P. E. I. SOLDIER RETURNS.—Among those who arrived in Summerside by the S. S. Northumberland on Tuesday night was Private W. C. Wright, of Summerside, son of Mr. Eliza Wright. He arrived in Halifax by a steamer on Monday being one of 1485 passengers, including 850 returned soldiers. Pte. Wright went over in the first contingent with the Strathcona Horse and was wounded first at Givenchy, then again at "Dickie Bush" and latterly was fallen upon by a horse and sustained a compound fracture. After his first injury it was found that a lot of metal was pressing so close to his spine that it would be fatal to attempt to remove it. He was paralyzed for a month. Then the metal eased off a bit and Wright went back to the fighting in a few weeks time still carrying, as he expressed it, "rough metal in my system to build a Ford car." Pte. Wright's many friends are delighted to see him again.
