Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alone side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 20 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivation 20 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. DANIEL REARDON

It is with sincere sorrow that the death is recorded of Mr. Daniel Reardon of this City, who passed peacefully away Friday night at the Charlottetown Hospital, where he had been for the past three months. Mr. Reardon was born at Covehead Road Lot 34 in 1845 and at the time of his death he was in his 71st year. His early life was spent on his farm in Covehead where he took an active interest in the affairs of his native district. He faithfully discharged the duties of Justice of the Peace and other public and private obligations which were placed upon him as a member of the community, and in his relations with his fellowmen he always displayed a warm heart and a generous spirit. For the past twenty-five years he resided in Charlottetown where he occupied the position of Deputy Sheriff or Bailiff of the County Court. In the discharge of his duty in connection with the office he has ever sought to do his work with the least possible friction or trouble to the parties interested and he always conducted himself with that dignity that should always belong to a public official. Besides a widow he leaves to mourn four sons and three daughters. His eldest son is the Rev. James M. Reardon and his daughter, Miss Agnes, both of St. Paul, Minn., visited him during his illness last March. The other members of the family are John F. Mrs. John Connolly, Charles, and M. W. at home and Catherine and Joseph at Los Angeles, Cal. They will cherish his memory and to the bereaved is tendered the most respectful sympathy.

THE LATE ANGUS McDONALD. Mr. Angus McDonald who departed this life in the Military Hospital in Moose Jaw, Sask., on April 15th, after several weeks illness with measles followed by pneumonia became a recruit about the 1st of March. Over four years ago he secured a homestead about 160 miles from Moose Jaw beside the one now owned and worked by his Uncle Daniel McDonald who accompanied the remains home. This promising man only 22 years actually gave his life in his country service and had a military funeral service where he died. Testimonials were sent to his uncle (who was not able for want of knowledge of illness to arrive) by Military Officials to his good character and great regrets expressed because of death. A very large company of people attended his funeral service conducted by Rev. Wm. McLeod on afternoon of 24th at residence of Mr. Alex McDonald, Mt. The death took place on Monday at noon of Mrs. Phillip Arsenault at the advanced age of 78. Deceased had been in failing health all winter and her demise was not unexpected. She was a woman of charitable disposition, and a good neighbor, and a devout Christian. During her illness she had several visits from her pastor who in her last stage of life, administered to her, all the requisite sacraments, preparatory for death. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning from St. James Church, and was well attended despite the almost impassable condition of the roads.
