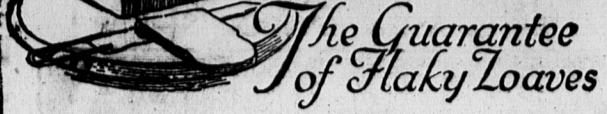

PARCEL POST FOR GERMANY.—A direct exchange of parcels by parcel post has been arranged between Canada and Germany. This will be in addition to the existing parcel post route via England. The first direct despatch will be forwarded by the S. S. Empress of France on the 14th instant. Full particulars as to rates, etc., can be obtained on application at the post office. The next despatch of mails for the United Kingdom will be by the Montcalm from Montreal on Friday, the 17th, Empress of France from Quebec on Saturday, the 18th and also Steamer Doric from Montreal on the 18th.

FIRE AT NORTH RIVER—A disastrous fire occurred at North River Thursday afternoon when the dwelling house and outbuildings owned by Mr. James R. Warren were completely destroyed together with their contents. The fire was first seen by Mr. Garfield Warren who at the time was driving along the road. Assistance was at once summoned but before anything could be done the house was a mass of ruins. The fire fighters then directed their attention to the outbuildings and after strenuous work in which every thing possible was done they succeeded in saving one barn. The fire the origin of which yet is a mystery caused a great loss to Mr. Warren the damage being estimated at \$3,000 a small portion of which is covered by insurance.

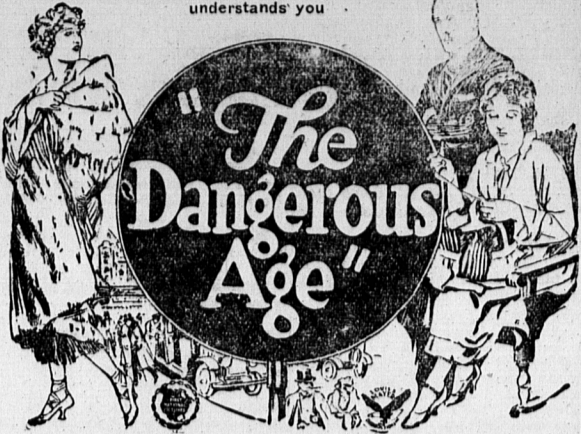
