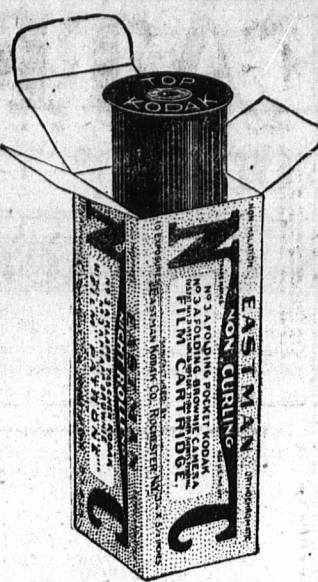

Greece Still Playing A Double Game
(Special to the Guardian.)
ATHENS, Sept. 12.—The French flag, which was hoisted over the legation here, has been hauled down out of deference to Greek opinion but the guard of French marines still remains. The British minister to Greece refused to the offer of a legation guard saying it was not necessary. Premier Zaimis offered his resignation to the king this afternoon. He pleaded that owing to constant difficulties arising of late he was unable to carry out negotiations of the greatest importance for Greece and which were imperative at the present moment. At the request of the king and on receiving assurance of confidence he withdrew his resignation.

FROM THE 105TH.—A copy of the "Ocean Times" printed on board ship during the voyage from Halifax to England, of the 105th ad other battalions, has reached the Guardian Office. The "Ocean Times" is not large and is issued only "every once in a while," but is bright, breezy and soldier-like. Numerous jokes, personal experiences and everyday happenings are recorded in the racy language of the soldier. Among the sober articles the following will be of interest to P. E. Islanders: The 105th Highland Battalion of Prince Edward Island are among the crack Canadian battalions on board ship and have already created a good impression among other units. This Battalion was recruited in Prince Edward Island, and is commanded by Lt. Col. A. E. Ings, who is also the senior officer in charge of the troops on board. The battalion has been in training for the past nine months and previous to embarking for overseas were encamped at Valcartier. The force was recruited chiefly among the Scotch people of the island who are the direct descendants of the Highland soldiers who fought and died in Britain's early wars for liberty and freedom. It is the firm resolve of every Officer, N. C. O. and men of the 105th to live up to the glorious record already achieved by the Canadian Battalion since the war began. They will be heard of from the trenches within the next few months and it will be mighty unpleasant for the Hun when they begin to operate. Here's to the One O Fifth.
