"Cradle to Grave" Bill Passes Commons

LONDON, Feb. 11 (CP)—The Labor Government's "cradle to grave" social security bill tonight passed the decisive second reading in the House of Commons.

The peak price was \$220, and a low of \$5. About 1,000 other pelts were offered and all sold at an average price of \$41, a 60 per cent increase. Canadian squirrel sold at an increase of 85 per cent at an average of 87 cents with a top of \$1.50. Raccoon was not in heavy demand, but the 41,420 pelts at the sale only 45 per cent found buyers, and prices were down 30 per cent. The average price was \$2.77 with a top of \$7. Prices of silver foxes, of which 42,680 were offered, averaged \$34.77, with specials averaging \$68.27 and an average of \$9.04 for low grade.

BREAKAGE OF EGGS
Breakage is the greatest single cause of loss in marketing eggs in Canada. Greater shell strength is needed. It is not a matter only of the loss on the cracked or broken eggs themselves but the loss in value of other eggs and packing material through smearing. There is also the unknown loss at point of production, in the nest, in gathering, and in handling on the farm, and in the consumer's home, according to a survey made by the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

It is not a question of whether egg shells are weaker now than before the war, but just a plain statement of fact that present egg shells are not sufficiently strong to withstand the hazards of transportation. Trains are heavier, jolts are more severe, and handling less careful. Something has to be done now to improve shell strength. Selection, breeding, feeding can all be brought to bear. It is something in which all phases of the industry can take part. Eggs with thin porous shells should not be used for setting.

Gen. Mark Clark's Action At Rapido River Is Upheld

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The War Department today upheld General Mark Clark's role in ordering the 1944 Rapido River crossing of the United States 38th Division in Italy and declared that the heavy casualties were not in vain.

The Department sent an official report to the House of Representatives Military Affairs Committee, which will determine later whether a Congressional investigation should be ordered.

Veterans of the 38th asked for one at a recent reunion at Brownwood, Tex. They criticized Gen. Clark particularly. As a result of their action and demands of congressmen, the committee asked for the army report.

Accompanying the report was a letter to Mr. May from War Secretary Patterson. It expressed regret over the loss of 2,128 men killed, wounded or missing in the battle. But it said that the attack, as a diversionary operation, had minimized losses at the Anzio beachhead.

Mr. Patterson wrote: "I have carefully examined the reports in this case and it is my conclusion that the action to which the 38th Division was committed was a necessary one and that Gen. Clark exercised sound judgment in planning it and ordering it." The report declared that the general campaign plan had been

worked out in a Christmas Day conference in 1943 at Gen. D. Eisenhower's headquarters, with Winston Churchill, then British Prime Minister, participating. The detailed planning of the Rapido attack was left to "subordinate echelons of command."

Expect Prices For Fur Coats Higher

OTTAWA, Feb. 11 (CP)—The chief of Canada's Fur Inspection and Grading Service had bad news today for the prospective purchaser of a fur coat.

Taking the recent fur auction sale in Montreal as a criterion, W.M. Ritchie said costs for sale for next winter were apparently going to cost more than those for sale in the autumn of 1945.

At Montreal, he said, most pelts sold at higher prices than at previous sales, with the exception of silver foxes, which sold from three to 15 per cent less.

There were 13,400 beaver pelts offered and they sold at 35 to 40 per cent higher. The average price was \$54.56 a pelt with a top price of \$100.50. Ermine pelts sold at a 65 per cent advance for a top of \$6.50 each. Mink was up 30 per cent, the average price being \$23.40 for ranch mink and \$37.75 for wild, with a top price of \$40.50 for the former and \$71.50 for the latter.

Mustel, the best of which are used for Hudson seal coats, were 30 per cent higher. Top price was \$9 a pelt with a low of 30 cents. Marten, of which about 2,200 pelts were offered, were not much in demand as only 51 per cent were sold.
