True Scot Is Heughan Sings Like Chaliapin
From Title Sheet He Calls the Tune—Six Feet—Two in His Kilts.
(By Augustus Bridle, in the Toronto Daily Star.)

William Heughan looks like a name and he sings as he looks. The program with which he opened his four-concert engagement in Massey Hall last night on the last lap of his round-the-world tour made an impression of at least one Scot, who in stature and singing ability, is a serious rival of Chaliapin.

He was dressed all in kilts; six feet two and as braw a boy as ever wore tartan or wielded a claymore. He tells a story about a song so well that you wonder why he bothers to sing it; and when he sings it you marvel that he bothered to speak it. He smiles like the top of the morning.

His songs last night were from several lands. His voice is enormous and truly musical, with a fine range and exact sense of pitch. He is a basso, but not quite a profundo; his low notes sound lower than they really are—which means low bass timbre, a rare thing in these days of top tones and French nasals. A true Scot is Heughan, in voice and in temper; who can sing you a cavity-resonance tone if you like it, but prefers mainly to sing as God makes him feel like doing.

He gave a fine heroic color to the Two Grenadiers, a trifle careless of the rhythm—and La Marsellaise at the end was as fine as Chaliapin's except for intensity of vibration. His Song of the Flea was as good as Chaliapin's if not better. In the Somerset comic he was no longer a Scot; one of the best numbers. He was impressive and bass-like in the Mozart aria from the Magic Flute, but not quite Mozartean. This not mere art that stimulates Heughan, but vitality. Never a dull moment when he is on stage. As happy as Lauder and often as impressive as Chaliapin without egotism.
